KEY QUESTION

How do we best mitigate traffic congestion for NWSL soccer game days to serve both residents and visitors AND improve transportation challenges for existing large events at White Stadium?

OUR APPROACH

The RFP asked for "a preliminary transportation plan". Boston Unity Soccer Partners (BUSP) included a multimodal plan in their submission. The City has since collaborated with Boston Unity Soccer to refine this plan using:

Public Feedback (Sept & Oct **Transportation** Meetings)

Franklin Park **Action Plan** guidelines

City transportation initiatives in nearby areas

In-depth traffic management analysis

Review of City enforcement tools to apply **Review of City &** BUSP new staff commitments (Parks Franklin Park Administrator, Boston **Unity Soccer** Community **Engagement Director**, etc.)



OUR APPROACH

We then developed transportation goals for game days at White Stadium:



Improve pedestrian safety, accessibility, and wayfinding at park entrances.



Make it easy for neighborhood residents and park visitors to get around.



Encourage use of sustainable transportation choices.



Ensure efficient traffic management during large events.



Use new and existing tools to protect parking and mobility in the surrounding neighborhoods, especially during big events.





OTHER EVENTS AT WHITE STADIUM AND THE PLAYSTEAD

White Stadium has continued to be the home to many large events **without** transportation plans.

Game Day transportation plans will serve as a **blueprint for other large events**.






1. ENCOURAGE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION



- Our first priority is encouraging people to take transit instead of driving
- Franklin Park is well served by public transit
- Boston Unity Soccer will run shuttles from **Red Line** and **Orange Line** stops
- We will partner with environmental organizations to implement sustainable transportation practices and raise awareness about green options








1. ENCOURAGE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION



Public transit is within a walkable distance.



Green Street Station to White Stadium
- 16 minutes



Gillette Stadium Outer Parking Lots to Entrance - 16 minutes



2. SUPPORT PEDESTRIANS AND CYCLISTS



- We expect many people will walk from Stony Brook and Green Street stations on the Orange Line
- Important pedestrian routes like School St, Boylston St, and Glen Rd will be traffic calmed
- An improved bike connection is planned as part of the Egleston Square Redesign project
- Repaying of School St between Washington and Walnut planned for this year








2. SUPPORT PEDESTRIANS AND CYCLISTS



We're moving faster than ever before to make our City streets safer by using speed humps, signal changes, street design tools and other interventions needed to curb speeding, reduce crashes, and make neighborhoods more comfortable for walking, biking, and rolling.








3. PROVIDE SATELLITE PARKING



- These lots are the only parking options for those who intend to drive and are intentionally far away from the stadium.
- Our strategy is to prevent game visitors from driving close to the stadium.
- There will be no parking for soccer fans on site, and no parking in nearby neighborhoods
- Boston Unity Soccer will provide satellite parking and shuttles to the stadium







3. PROVIDE SHUTTLES FROM PUBLIC TRANSIT AND SATELLITE PARKING

- BUSP originally suggested reopening the Seaver St exit but decided against it due to community feedback
- Southern Shuttle Loops will serve:
 - Southwest satellite parking
 - East satellite Parking
 - Forest Hills MBTA stations
 - Red Line MBTA stations
- Shuttles on Circuit Drive will turn around in the Valley Gates lot








3. PROVIDE SHUTTLES FROM PUBLIC TRANSIT AND SATELLITE PARKING



Northern Shuttle Loops will serve:

- Northwest satellite parking
- Northeast satellite Parking
- Jackson Square MBTA stations

Shuttles will turn around in the Walnut Street entrance








3. PROVIDE SHUTTLES FROM PUBLIC TRANSIT AND

Shuttle frequency on Walnut Ave for proposed Northern Loop

 Adds 28 vehicles an hour for four hours total on game days



3. PROVIDE SHUTTLES FROM PUBLIC TRANSIT AND SATELLITE PARKING (Alt Route)

We were asked to look at the impact of an alternate route.

- Jackson Square <-> White Stadium via
 Walnut: Approx 6 to 7 minutes
- Jackson Square <-> White Stadium via Circuit Drive: Approx 12 to 14 minutes

This represents a trip that is twice as long and not compatible with encouraging T use

There is potential for satellite parking northwest of site, depending on exact parking facility and route taken. We will continue to evaluate as facilities are chosen.










4. TRAFFIC OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT





Traffic Operations Managers and Traffic Ambassadors will be provided for traffic flow and pedestrian safety







5. RIDESHARE AND CARPOOL

We know that a certain portion of fans will use rideshare. Rideshare will be directed to pick up/drop off at the Humboldt-Seaver Street Lot. Traffic management staff will be placed in this area.







5. RIDESHARE AND CARPOOL

Currently, when there are large events at White Stadium, a great deal of drop off happens on Walnut/Sigourney, which is unsafe and causes congestion. There are multiple strategies we can pursue and scale up or down as needed:

First level:

- Variable message board at the intersection of Walnut and Seaver directing drop offs to the Seaver Street lot.
- Change the address for White Stadium in GIS mapping to Seaver Street so that drop offs are routed there
- Restrict parking and enforce no stopping on Walnut Ave from Montebello Road to Park Lane.
- Additional traffic ambassadors on Walnut to keep people moving along

Second level: All the above, plus variable message board saying Walnut is closed off to all traffic except shuttles, emergency vehicles, and residents

Third level: All the above, plus physically barricade oncoming traffic except for residents, except shuttles, emergency vehicles, and residents







6. PRESERVE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKING AND MOBILITY



- BTD will create a neighborhood-specific game day parking program for residents and their visitors on streets within the identified White Stadium walk area.
- Plans will be tailored to the needs of each neighborhood.
- The program will allow residents with a Jamaica Plain Resident Permit Parking (RPP) sticker on their vehicle to park on the streets where parking is prohibited on game days.
- A visitor parking placard will be available to residents regardless of vehicle ownership, so long as they live on a street in the White Stadium walk shed
 - Proposal: 1 visitor permit per house issued annually







6. PRESERVE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKING AND MOBILITY



Key coordination and enforcement tools on game days

- **Senior Operations Manager:** Boston Unity Soccer will hire an executive leader to engage with community members for feedback and coordination on all operational concerns (traffic, parking, trash/cleanup, etc.)
- New Event Fee Violation: Introduce a \$100 fine for parking violations on game days in designated areas.
- **Installation of Tow Zone Signs:** Add "Tow Zone No Stopping" signs on game days, exempting residents and their visitors with Jamaica Plain Resident Permit (RPP) stickers.
 - Effective 4 hours before and 1 hour after games
- Dedicated BTD parking enforcement: Assign a shift on game days. Towing would be activated to support enforcement







7. PRESERVE MOBILITY FOR NON-SOCCER PARK VISITORS



Coordinating with Zoo, Golf, Playstead and Franklin Park permit holders

- Soccer game attendees will not be allowed to park in Franklin Park lots.
- We are committed to retaining parking for key park destinations such as the Zoo, Golf Course, and Shattuck picnic area and tennis courts.
- Park rangers and BPD officers will enforce parking restrictions with support from game day traffic ambassadors.
- All park visitors can access free Boston Unity Soccer shuttles from MBTA stations on game days.
- We will work closely with Franklin Park stakeholders such as the Zoo and Golf Course to craft an operational plan.






6. PRESERVE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKING AND MOBILITY

LONG TERM TRANSPORTATION INITIATIVES: IN PLANNING

BLUE HILL AVENUE TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN

- What: full-scale redesign of Blue Hill Avenue from Warren St to River St
- Who: MBTA & FTA, City of Boston
 - Will include: center-running bus lanes and boarding platforms, expanded tree canopy, safer crosswalks, and other roadway features
- Timeline:
 - 2024 State-of-good-repair work along the corridor, including crosswalk re-striping, streetlight upgrades, patch paving, and sidewalk repairs
 - 2024/25 Block-by-block community engagement to inform design; short-term improvements
 - o 2026 Major construction begins




OTHER PROJECTS IN PLANNING STAGE

- BOWDOIN-GENEVA TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN
 - o Developing design solutions with the community to address pedestrian safety, traffic safety, and speeding on local streets.
 - o Speed humps installed this winter. Planning discussions continue in 2024
- COLUMBIA ROAD TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN
 - Improve safety on the Columbia Road with a climate resilient, neighborhood-friendly corridor.
 - o Community conversations launch this Spring.
