### **KEY QUESTION**

How do we best manage traffic for NWSL soccer game days to serve both residents and visitors AND improve transportation challenges for existing large events at White Stadium?

### OUR APPROACH

The RFP asked for "a preliminary transportation plan". Boston Unity Soccer Partners (BUSP) included a multimodal plan in their submission. The City has since collaborated with Boston Unity Soccer to refine this plan using:

Public Feedback (Sept & Oct **Transportation** Meetings)

Franklin Park **Action Plan** guidelines

City transportation initiatives in nearby areas

In-depth traffic management analysis

**Review of** City enforcement tools to apply

**Review of City &** BUSP new staff commitments (new Parks staff, Community **Engagement** Director, etc.)



### **OUR APPROACH**

We then developed transportation goals for game days at White Stadium:



Improve pedestrian safety, accessibility, and wayfinding at park entrances.



Make it easy for neighborhood residents and park visitors to get around.



Encourage use of sustainable transportation choices.



Ensure efficient traffic management during large events.



Use new and existing tools to protect parking and mobility in the surrounding neighborhoods, especially during big events.





### OTHER EVENTS AT WHITE STADIUM AND THE PLAYSTEAD






### 1. ENCOURAGE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION



- Our first priority is encouraging people to take transit instead of driving
- Franklin Park is well served by public transit
- Boston Unity Soccer will run shuttles from Red Line and Orange Line stops
- We intend to implement sustainable transportation practices and raise awareness about green options












### 3. PROVIDE SATELLITE PARKING



- For those who intend to drive, our strategy is to prevent them from driving close to the stadium.
- There will be no parking for soccer fans on site, and no parking in nearby neighborhoods
- Boston Unity Soccer will provide satellite parking and shuttles to the stadium







# 3. PROVIDE SHUTTLES FROM PUBLIC TRANSIT AND SATELLITE PARKING



- BUSP originally suggested reopening the Seaver St exit but decided against it due to community feedback
- Southern Shuttle Loops will serve:
  - Southwest satellite parking
  - East satellite Parking
  - Forest Hills MBTA stations
  - Red Line MBTA stations
- Shuttles on Circuit Drive will turn around in the Valley Gates lot











Traffic Operations Managers and Traffic Ambassadors will be provided for traffic flow and pedestrian safety







### **5. RIDESHARE AND CARPOOL**



We know that a certain portion of fans will use rideshare.



We will use GPS and Variable Message Board to direct pick up and drop off to Humboldt/Seaver Street and station traffic management staff here.







- BTD will create a neighborhood-specific game day parking program for residents and their visitors on streets within the identified White Stadium walk area.
- Plans will be tailored to the needs of each neighborhood.
- The program will allow residents with a Roxbury Resident Permit Parking (RPP) sticker on their vehicle to park on the streets where parking is prohibited on game days.
- A visitor parking placard, or hang tag, will be available to residents regardless of vehicle ownership, so long as they live on a street in the White Stadium walk area.
  - 1 visitor permit per house
  - Issued annually











- The Walk Area is the shaded orange area where we will protect parking for residents and their visitors.

Key enforcement measures

- New Event Fee Violation: Introduce a \$100 fine for parking violations on game days in designated areas around White Stadium.
- Installation of Tow Zone Signs: Add "Tow Zone No Stopping Game Days" signs, exempting residents with Roxbury Resident Permit (RPP) stickers.
  - Effective 4 hours before and 1 hour after games
- Dedicated BTD parking enforcement: Assign a shift on game days
  - Towing would be activated to support enforcement





### 7. PRESERVE MOBILITY FOR PARK VISITORS



Coordinating with Zoo, Golf, Playstead and Franklin Park permit holders

- Soccer game attendees will not be allowed to park in Franklin Park lots.
- We are committed to retaining parking for key park destinations such as the Zoo, Golf Course, and Shattuck picnic area and tennis courts.
- Park rangers and BPD officers will enforce parking restrictions with support from game day traffic ambassadors.
- All park visitors can access free Boston Unity Soccer shuttles from MBTA stations on game days.
- We will work closely with Franklin Park stakeholders such as the Zoo and Golf Course to craft an operational plan.

#### LONG TERM TRANSPORTATION INITIATIVES: IN PLANNING

#### BLUE HILL AVENUE TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN

- What: full-scale redesign of Blue Hill Avenue from Warren St to River St
- Who: MBTA & FTA, City of Boston
  - Will include: center-running bus lanes and boarding platforms, expanded tree canopy, safer crosswalks, and other roadway features
- Timeline:
  - 2024 State-of-good-repair work along the corridor, including crosswalk re-striping, streetlight upgrades, patch paving, and sidewalk repairs
  - 2024/25 Block-by-block community engagement to inform design; short-term improvements
  - o 2026 Major construction begins



#### OTHER PROJECTS IN PLANNING STAGE

- BOWDOIN-GENEVA TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN
  - o Developing design solutions with the community to address pedestrian safety, traffic safety, and speeding on local streets.
  - o Speed humps installed this winter. Planning discussions continue in 2024
- COLUMBIA ROAD TRANSPORTATION ACTION PLAN
  - o Improve safety on the Columbia Road with a climate resilient, neighborhood-friendly corridor.
  - o Community conversations launch this Spring.



# **Preserve Neighborhood Parking and Mobility**

- The City's proposed commitment:
  - BTD will develop and implement a game day on street parking program for residents who live on streets in the White Stadium walk shed. The program will <u>not</u> create Resident Permit Parking (RPP) in the respective neighborhoods, but will allow residents and their visitors to park on the street on game days.
  - Before White Stadium opens for Boston Unity games, BTD will develop neighborhood specific parking plans in the White Stadium walk shed where residents will be co-creators of parking and curbside regulations, which may or may not include RPP, depending on the neighborhood's desire.
- Specifically, residents in the White Stadium walk shed would be eligible to complete an online application similar to the current <u>RPP application</u>. Residents would then receive a sticker to place on their vehicle. This application could also be completed in person at the Office of the Parking Clerk at City Hall.
- As part of this application process, Residents could also apply for a visitor parking placard which would allow a guest to park on the street on game days. Visitor parking placards would also be available to residents that do not own a vehicle so long as they live in the White Stadium walk shed.



# **Event-Specific (Game Day) Traffic Management Plan**


- Show entire walk shed area with game day on street parking restrictions, then zoom in to Dorchester 0
- Show overlay of which streets are already covered by RPP to give the full picture
- **Enforcement mechanisms:** 
  - As part of the upcoming revision to the City of Boston Traffic Rules and Regulation, create a new \$100 event fee violation for White Stadium walk shed
  - Installation of No Stopping on Boston Unity (or White Stadium Event?) Game Days within the White Stadium walk shed (show sample sign from Allston Brighton/Boston College)
    - Signs to read no parking 4 hours before and 1 hour after game/event
  - A supplemental BTD parking enforcement shift will be assigned to the White Stadium walk shed on game days
  - Either the BTD Tow and Hold unit or a private towing vendor would support towing operations
- To accommodate shuttle bus, pedestrian and bike access and egress, parking will be restricted and no stopping will be enforced on Walnut Ave from Montebello Road to Park Lane (show visual on slide)
- Parking will be restricted on the west, southbound side of Seaver Street from Humboldt Ave to Elm Hill Ave to provide a drop off/pickup location for ride share and other users. (show visual on slide)
- Insert other drop off/pickup location? (show visual)
- BTD will enforce the 2-Hour parking restrictions at the two municipal lots in Egleston Square, #24 (Washington & Atherton) and #33 (Washington across from Dental Dreams).

# A BIT OF HISTORY

In **1974**, "Uptown in the Park" featured Sly and the Family Stone, the Tower of Power, the Hues Corporation, Richard Pryor, and others.





- What are the other ways people can get to the stadium other than shuttles?
  - This deck will cover multimodal approaches to reaching the stadium.
- What will the walk-shed radius of game day parking restrictions be and can it be expanded?
- Is there a set place for ADA parking to go to the games? Are they expected to take shuttles?
  - Golf Carts will be provided for those with ADA needs from all shuttle and rideshare drop off points
- How will the City ensure the safety of pedestrians on game days?
- How will the transportation plan mitigate congestion and traffic? What are the mechanics if a neighborhood doesn't otherwise have residential parking restrictions? How will game-day parking restrictions be enforced?  $\rightarrow$  next slide


- Show proposed internal park circulation plan


