Workforce Development and Community Programs	Educational Partnerships: To encourage underrepresented students of color to explore and pursue careers in health and science, Dana-Farber maintains educational partnerships with Boston-area high schools and colleges. During Academic Year 2016-2017, 22 students participated in a college and career readiness training program. An additional 40 students were enrolled during the summer for a total of 60 student interns. Eligible students either attended or graduated from Boston Public Schools. During the 7-week summer program, students interned 30-hours per week and participated in college tours and career readiness workshops. DFCI also participates actively in school-to-career programs with the Boston Private Industry Council (PIC). One such program includes Groundhog Job Shadow Day, where 20 students shadow DFCI employees to learn about careers in healthcare and specific job responsibilities, as well as the skills and training needed for these positions.
