BAC Green Alley	The permeable pavement in Alley #444, located between the College's 951 Boylston Street building and 320 Newbury Street building, allows water to percolate into the earth rather than through the storm drains. Both permeable asphalt and permeable unit paver systems were installed over a large common gravel bed designed to collect, store, and drain rain water from the alley surfaces and two BAC rooftops. Below ground, designers and construction managers on the project had to work around many existing utilities, including the infrastructure of the recently installed geothermal wells.
