I'M HAVING A COMMUNITY FORUM ON MAY 7 TO DISCUSS THE ECONOMIC RECOVERY OF THE SQUARE AND THIS IS AN AREA IN THE CITY THAT THE OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN THE PAST THROUGH MY LEADERSHIP HAS PAID SOME EXTRA

I WANT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT IS HAPPENING NOW. SO SOME QUESTIONS REGARDING THE SQUARE, WHAT SUPPORT IS BEING GIVEN TO THE BUSINESSES THERE ESPECIALLY NOW DURING COVID-19. I'M INTERESTED IN UNDERSTANDING IF THE CITY IS KEEPING TRACK OF WHICH BUSINESSES ARE STILL OPEN. WHICH HAVE HAD TO CLOSE, WHICH **BUSINESSES WERE PLANNING TO** RELOCATE, ARE WE IN TOUCH WITH THEM. THERE'S SOME FOOD PLACES THAT HAVE HAD TO CLOSE BECAUSE THEY WERE VERY DEPENDENT ON THE EMPLOYEES OF THE BOWLING BUILDING THE SUPPORT THEIR BUSINESSES. WHEN PEOPLE WORK FROM HOME. THERE'S LESS BUSINESSES FOR THEM. THERE'S RESTAURANTS AND CAFES HAVE HAD TO CLOSE. WHAT IS EOD DOING TO SUPPORT THEM SO WE CAN MAKE SURE THAT THEY'RE ABLE TO REOPEN. I'M INTERESTED IN UNDERSTANDING IF ANY BUSINESSES AND MUSEUMS NEED RELIEF FROM THE SMALL BUSINESS RELIEF FUND. IF SO, HOW MANY AND HOW MUCH. AND THEN WE'VE TALKED A LOT ABOUT BECAUSE OF THE CURRENT SITUATION WITH THE PANDEMIC THAT SOME OF OUR OPERATIONS HAVE SHUT DOWN AROUND LICENSING AND ZONING AND IN PARTICULAR THOSE IMPACTS ON BUSINESSES, HOW ON THE OTHER END OF THIS AS WE WORK TO REOPEN HOW DOES EOB SEE ITS OWN OFFICE RESOURCES, WHICH WOULD BE A FINANCIAL INVESTMENT THROUGH THE BUDGET, HOW WILL WE USE THOSE RESOURCES TO INTENSELY SUPPORT BUSINESSES ON THAT RESTART, IF ANY LICENSES HAVE LAPSED OR NEED TO BE RENEWED OR UPDATED OR CHANGED, HOW DO WE SORT OF CREATE A FAST LINE OR A ZIP LINE OF SORTS TO MAKE SURE THAT THOSE **BUSINESSES CAN COME ONLINE** OUICKLY. WE'VE TALKED AS A CITY QUITE EXTENSIVELY ABOUT SUPPORTING FOOD-RELATED BUSINESSES AND RESTAURANTS. I THINK THAT WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE AN EQUAL BIT OF ATTENTION PAID TO BUSINESSES THAT ARE NOT RESTAURANT FOCUSED ALL THOSE THEY'RE CRITICALLY IMPORTANT IN GREAT PARTS OF OUR NEIGHBORHOODS ACROSS THE CITY. I'M A BIG FAN OF NOT JUST TAKE OUT TUESDAY BUT TAKE IT EVERY DAY AND DOING WHAT I CAN TO SUPPORT RESTAURANT BUSINESSES. THERE ARE OTHER BUSINESSES IN THE PIPELINE. WHERE THEY HAVE NEEDED OUR SUPPORT GENERALLY OUTSIDE OF THIS PANDEMIC, THIS MAGNIFIES SOME OF THEIR NEEDS. SO I WILL -- I HAVE A FEW MORE QUESTIONS. I'LL SAVE THEM FOR THE NEXT ROUND. IF WE WANT TO TALK ABOUT AN

EQUITABLE RECOVERY, PROJECTS IN

THE CITY ARE ABIDING BY THAT

POLICY AND INTERESTING IN HOW THE TECH ENHANCEMENTS WILL HELP US ON THAT.

UNDERSTANDING THE DEPARTMENT'S OVERSIGHT OF CASINOS AND WHAT RESOURCES ARE DEDICATED TO THAT. THAT IS SOMEBODY THAT HAS BEEN ADDED IN THE LAST FEW YEARS. I'M NOT TOTALLY CLEAR ON WHAT OUR INTERFACE WITH THE CASINO EFFORT IS.

COUNCILLOR MEJIA MENTIONED THE RFP RELATED TO REAL INVESTMENTS IN OUR MAIN STREETS TO PREPARE FOR HOSTING THIS MAIN STREETS CONVENTION IN 2021, WHICH WE HOPE WE'LL BE BACK HOSTING CONVENTIONS BY 2021.

SEEMS TO ME WHERE THAT ISSUED RFP WAS ABOUT SHOWCASE AGO GREAT MAIN STREETS PROGRAM AND ORDINARY TIME, IT SEEMS LIKE NOW THE QUESTION WILL BE WHAT CAN WE BOSTON DO TO BE A LEADER AND

MODEL IN REVITALIING OUR MAIN

STREETS AFTER COVID-19.

I WASN'T CLEAR IF AN RPF WAS ISSUED AND IF THERE'S A WAY TO REFRAME IT AND MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE MEETING THE MOMENT WE'RE IN THERE AND THINKING ABOUT HOW HOSTING THAT CONFERENCE CAN BE ABOUT RECOVERY FOR OUR LOCAL MAIN STREETS.

I'M INTERESTED COUNCILLOR MEJIA MENTIONED THE CHALLENGE THAT EOD TALKED ABOUT.

SEEM LIKE MOBILE ENTERPRISES WILL BE MORE IMPORTANT NOW AS WE WANT TO DO MORE BUSINESS OUTSIDE FOR THE SHORT TO MEDIUM TERM. SO ALSO I THINK THE REALITY THAT UNFORTUNATELY BECAUSE OF THE CHANGE IN THE UNEMPLOYMENT SITUATION AS COUNCILLOR O'MALLEY REFERENCED. THERE'S A LOT OF

TALENTED PEOPLE RIGHT NOW LOOKING FOR WORK.

THE QUESTION IS CAN THE CITY TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE BAD SIDE OF THIS CRISIS TO GET SOME GREAT TECHNICAL SUPPORT CAPACITY IN WORKING AT EOD.

THAT WOULD MAKE SENSE IF THEY'VE

HAD A CHALLENGE WITH HIRING FOR THAT.

SIMILARLY, I'M INTERESTED IN THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR SMALL BUSINESS PROGRAMS, HOW WE CAN REALLY SCALE THAT UP, HOW THEY ARE SCALING IT UP.

THERE'S BEEN A LOT OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IN THE LAST COUPLE MONTHS HELPING RESTAURANTS MOVE TO TAKE-OUT, HELPING PEOPLE WITH PPE APPLICATION AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL.

JUST SORT OF, YOU KNOW,

IN GENERAL, THERE'S A REFERENCE IN THE OED'S RESPONSE TO OUR COUNCIL QUESTIONS THAT SAYS OBVIOUSLY YOU CAN ALWAYS USE MORE PERSONNEL RESOURCES BUT A TIME YOU HAVE TO DO MORE WITH LESS.

IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IS A PLACE WHERE BECAUSE OF THE MULTIPLIER EFFECT REALLY EFFECTIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SUPPORT LIKE WE SHOULD AND THIS REALLY CONNECT TO COUNCILLOR ARROYO'S QUESTION, WE SHOULD BE SEEING STAFF GROWTH IN EOD FOR THE YEAR AHEAD.

I RECOGNIZE THAT THE BUDGET,
ALTHOUGH IT WAS TWEAKED AFTER
THIS EMERGENCY EMERGED, WASN'T
FULLY CHANGED IN RESPONSE TO
THAT AND JUST -- IT SEEMS TO ME
LIKE WE SHOULD BE -- BASED ON
WHAT WE LEARNED THE LAST EIGHT
WEEKS THINKING AND WHAT ARE THE
REALLY HIGH IMPACTS HIRES THAT
OED COULD BE MAKING RIGHT NOW
THAT WOULD LIKE LET US RAMP UP
OUR SUPPORT FOR THE YEAR AHEAD
IN A WAY THAT COMES BACK AS A

CITY IN TERMS OF BUSINESS, VIBRANCY AND RECOVERY. SO I'D LIKE THE DEPARTMENT TO ADDRESS AND WITH THE SUPPORT OF THE BUDGET OFFICE ADDRESS THE OUESTION OF WHETHER THEY'RE LIKE LOOKING TO MAKE ADJUSTMENT UPWARDS ON THAT FRONT. RECOGNIZING THAT WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE LOOKING AT A RESUBMISSION WITH MORE MONEY IN THE BUDGET. SO ADJUSTMENTS UPWARDS HAVE TO BE PAID FOR SOMEWHERE. JUST SEEMS LIKE IF THERE'S ONE PLACE WHERE WE NEED TO BE MAKING SURE WE'VE GOT ADEQUATE SUPPORT RESOURCES IN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. AND THEN I THINK JUST IN GENERAL RELATED TO THAT, A QUESTION ABOUT WHETHER OR NOT EOD HAS ANALYZED THE LAST FEW YEARS OR HOW THEY THINK ABOUT WHAT THE HIGHEST IMPACT THINGS THAT THEY DO ARE. AND I SAY THAT BECAUSE, YOU KNOW, THERE'S A LOT OF THINGS THAT ARE NICE TO. HAVE IT'S NICE TO HELP AROUND THE EDGES ON VARIOUS THINGS. THERE'S THINGS THAT LIKE ACTUALLY ALLOW BUSINESS TO GO FORWARD THAT WOULDN'T HAVE BEEN ABLE TO GO FORWARD. I THINK THOSE -- IT'S THE HIGHEST IMPACT PLACES THAT WE NEED TO PUT OUR RESOURCES. I'M INTERESTED IN HOW MUCH THE DEPARTMENT HAS DONE ABOUT WHAT ARE THE PROGRAMS THAT IT HAS TO SEEM TO REALLY MOVE THE NEEDLE IN TERMS OF SMALL BUSINESS SUCCESS. WRAPPING THOSE UP, PARTICULARLY WITH OUR SMALL BUSINESSES, FAMILY OWNED BUSINESSES, WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESSES, ALL THE PEOPLE THAT WHEN TO SUCCEED. THE MONEY STAYS IN THE CITY AND PART OF OUR VITAL ECOSYSTEM HERE. MY LAST SET OF QUESTIONS IS REALLY ABOUT -- IT ABOUT, YOU

KNOW, CONTRACTING CITYWIDE. IT JUST SEEMS AS THOUGH THAT IS

SOMETHING THAT I KNOW HAS BEEN IDENTIFIED AS AN IMPORTANT PRIORITY, IT'S SOMETHING THAT THE OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT HAS PROGRAMS DEVOTED TO.

IT'S A LONG-TERM TRAJECTORY.
CAN WE BUILD A PIPELINE OVER
FIVE YEARS, ET CETERA.
BUT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE A LOT OF
BUSINESSES THAT WON'T SURVIVE IN
THE NEXT 12 MONTHS.

THERE'S CERTAIN THINGS IN THE CITY.

I THINK ABOUT PROVIDING SHELTER.
OR SOME OF THE STUFF ON THE BPS
SIDE THAT WE WOULD HAVE SAID WE
COULDN'T DO THEM ON THE TIMELINE
AND WE FIGURE OUT HOW TO DO IT.
SIMILARLY, FIGURING OUT HOW TO
DRAMATICALLY DIVERSIFY THE
CONTRACTING POOL THE CITY OF
BOSTON IS PULLING FROM.
I KNOW IT'S BEEN A REAL SORT OF
CHALLENGE FOR OUR DEPARTMENT AND
SOMETHING THAT OED IS WORKING
HARD ON.

WE HAVE TO APPROACH THIS MOMENT CRISIS THERE OR WE WILL HAVE AN UNEQUITABLE RECOVERY IN TERMS HOFF HOW CITY DOLLARS GET SPENT. THAT IS BECAUSE IF WE DON'T CHANGE WHAT WE'RE DOING. SO I WOULD LIKE TO HEAR FROM OED A STRATEGY ON THAT FRONT. HOW DO WE THROW THE KITCHEN SINK AT THIS.

I'M INTERESTED IN UNDERSTANDING

WHETHER CANNABIS BUSINESSES

QUALIFIED FOR THOSE FUNDS, IF

THEY QUALIFIED, HOW MANY

APPLIED, HOW MANY -- HOW MUCH

MONEY DID THEY GET, WHAT COULD

THEY USE THAT MONEY FOR.

IF THAT -- IF THEY DID NOT

QUALIFY FOR ANY OF THOSE FUNDS

BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT MANY ARE

OPEN THE HOOK FOR LOTS OF MONEY

EVEN THOUGH THEY DON'T HAVE

THEIR BUSINESSES OPEN AND

RUNNING.

IF THEY DIDN'T QUALIFY AS WE'RE

THINKING ABOUT NEW ROUNDS, I'D

BE INTERESTED IN WHAT THE

ADMINISTRATION PLANS ARE FOR

CASTING THE NET A LITTLE WIDER

TO ENINCLUDE SOME OF THOSE

ENTREPRENEURS AS PART OF THE

RECOVERY.

I'M ALSO VERY MUCH INTERESTED --

I KNOW WE'LL GET TO SOME OF

I'M CURIOUS ABOUT WHAT WE'RE

SMALLER TYPE OF LOCAL BUSINESSES

THAT HAVE TRADITIONALLY THRIVED

IN THEIR OWN RIGHT.

BUT NOW AS A RESULT OF COVID-19

HAVE HAD TO SHUT THEIR DOORS DOWN.

SOME OF THOSE BUSINESSES YOU TAKE OUT AND DRY SOMEBODY'S

JUST TRYING TO FIGURE OUT WHAT TYPE OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND SUPPORT AND FUNDING ARE WE GOING TO BE PUTTING ASIDE TO SUPPORT THESE BUSINESSES THAT -- AND IF THEY DO OPEN THEIR DOORS, YOU KNOW, WHAT TYPE OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WILL THEY RECEIVE AND DO IT IN A WAY THAT IS SAFE.

SO THINKING ABOUT THAT PLANNING.

I'M CURIOUS ABOUT THAT.

I'M ALSO CURIOUS ABOUT. YOU

KNOW, THE CAPACITY AND THE

STAFFING OF THE OFFICE.

JUST WONDERING IF THEY HAVE

ENOUGH STAFFING TO ADDRESS THE

NEEDS OF 700,000 -- WE HAVE A BIG CITY.

WE HAVE A LOT OF BUSINESSES. I JUST DON'T KNOW WHETHER OR NOT THEY HAVE THE CAPACITY TO BE ABLE TO, YOU KNOW, GIVEN THE NEED AT THIS POINT, WHETHER OR NOT THEY'RE FULLY STAFFED TO DO SO.

I'M ALSO JUST CURIOUS ABOUT KNOWING THAT WE HAD A LOT OF ISSUES AROUND LANGUAGE ACCESS DURING THE RELIEF FUND APPLICATION PROCESS, JUST REALLY CURIOUS ABOUT WHAT LESSONS THAT THEY LEARNED AS A RESULT OF COVID-19 AND HOW THEY ADJUST TO RIGHT THOSE WRONGS IN TERMS OF OUTREACH AND ACCESS AND ALL THAT GOOD STUFF.

SO DEFINITELY HAVE THEIR WORK CUT OUT.

SO THE MORE WE CAN BETTER UNDERSTAND WHERE THE GAPS ARE AND THEIR FINANCIAL NEEDS THE BETTER WE CAN SUPPORT THEM. SO TO COME TO THE TABLE AND BE CLEAR ABOUT WHERE THOSE GAPS ARE WILL BE REALLY HELPFUL TO US. >> GREAT.

THANK YOU SO MUCH, COUNCILLOR MEJIA.

COUNCILLOR ESSAIBI-GEORGE.

>> THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I STEPPED AWAY FOR A SECOND. SO I DON'T THINK ANYONE ASKED ABOUT THE OFFICE OF TOURISM. ALTHOUGH WE ARE IN THE MIDST OF GLOBAL TRAVEL SHUT DOWN, I DO RECOGNIZE THAT BOSTON IS A HUGE DESTINATION FOR LOTS OF VISITS, ESPECIALLY IN THE WARMER MONTHS AND INTO THE FALL. SO CERTAINLY CURIOUS ABOUT THE IMPACT THIS PANDEMIC HAS HAD ON TOURISM AND WHAT THAT MEANS FOR RECEIPTS AND CERTAINLY SALES TAX AND ALL THAT FOR THE STATE AND FOR THE CITY. SO CURIOUS ABOUT THE WORK AND THE PLANNING THAT NEEDS TO GO FORWARD TO MAKE SURE THAT WE CAN REBUILD THAT INDUSTRY, REBUILD OUR -- REBUILD OPPORTUNITIES FOR TRAVEL TO BOSTON AND THE TOURISM INDUSTRY WITH THE UNCERTAINTY OF OUR COLLEGES. FOR THE FALL AND THE IMPACT THAT NOT HAVING THOSE COLLEGES MAY BE HAPPENING IN PERSON, WHAT IMPACTS DOES THAT HAVE. WE CERTAINLY KNOW WHAT THE LACK OF GRADUATIONS THAT IMPACT ALL OF OUR HOTELS AND A LOT OF OUR LOCAL ECONOMIES. BUT AS WE WORK TO REBUILD ALONG THE LINES OF THE CONVERSATION AROUND AN EQUITABLE REBUILDING ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THIS PANDEMIC, WE SHOULD ALSO HAVE --THIS IS AN OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE REBUILDING OUR TOURISM INDUSTRY WITH THAT IN MIND AS WELL. THIS IS NOT JUST ABOUT THE DOWNTOWN CORRIDOR OR SORT OF THE TYPICAL TOURISM HOT SPOTS BUT MAKING SURE THAT THIS IS PART OF A LARGER VISION FOR OUR CITY. THE TOURISM IN GENERAL, WHERE ARE WE? WHERE ARE WE GOING? WHAT ARE THE PLANS THAT WE CAN PUT IN PLACE FOR THAT AND HOW CAN WE MAKE SURE THAT ALL OF OUR COMMUNITIES ARE SEEING A PIECE

OF THAT REBUILD.

I'M LOOKING AT THE REST OF MY NOTES HERE AS THEY'RE COVID SPECIFIC.

I'M TRYING TO BE MINDFUL THAT OUR QUESTIONS ARE CERTAINLY --OUR BUDGET IS IMPACTED BY THE PANDEMIC AND OUR QUESTIONS ARE LEANING THAT WAY.

BUT THERE IS -- I THINK THERE'S NEEDS TO MAINTAIN A FOCUS FOR US AND A FOCUS FOR THE DEPARTMENT ABOUT CONTINUING OPERATIONS IN A NONCORONA SPECIFIC WAY.

EVENTUALLY WE'LL BE ON THE OTHER SIDE.

IT WILL CHANGE PRACTICE, CHANGE BUSINESS AND CHANGE THE ECONOMY, THE LOCAL ECONOMY OF BOSTON AND THE LOCAL ECONOMY OF OUR COMMUNITIES.

SO THE REST OF THE WORK NEEDS TO HAPPEN.

I DON'T KNOW IF ANYONE ASKED SPECIFICALLY ABOUT WHAT OUR INITIAL -- THE INITIAL RESPONSES TO RESTAURANTS THAT ARE NOW PERMITTED TO SERVE AND WHAT THAT MEANS AND WHAT THAT MAY MEAN FOR THEM.

JUST, YOU KNOW, AS THE GOVERNOR HAS DONE, THIS REOPENING TASK FORCE, I'M WONDERING WHAT THE EFFORTS ARE.

I THINK THIS LENDS ITSELF TO COUNCILLOR FLAHERTY'S QUESTION AT THE BEGINNING WHAT ARE WE DOING AS A CITY, WHAT OUR TASK FORCE LOOKS LIKE OR THE

REOPENING THE CITY ESPECIALLY AROUND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. YOU KNOW COUNCILLOR ARROYO AND I HAVE CALLED FOR A HEARING AROUND

HAVE CALLED FOR A HEARING AROUND

THE RETURN TO SCHOOL.

BUT WHAT HAVE THE RETURN TO BUSINESS LOOK LOOK FOR OUR CITY

AND WHAT IS THAT EFFORT

UNDERWAY.

THE GIVING ME ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY. AS RELATES TO COUNCILLOR ESSAIBI-GEORGE'S COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS, I ALSO WANTED TO TALK A LITTLE ABOUT TOURISM, BUT SPECIFICALLY, YOU KNOW, WHAT ARE WE DOING TO HELP THE HOTEL OPERATORS AND THE OWNERS AS WELL. I ALSO WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT DURING THESE DIFFICULT ECONOMIC TIMES IN THE HOTEL INDUSTRY THAT WE'RE MINDFUL OF THE FACT THAT THESE ARE GOOD JOBS FOR MANY BOSTON RESIDENTS AND THE HOTELS. THE RESTAURANTS. LOCAL 26 HIRES A -- THEY HAVE A LOT OF WOMEN, A LOT OF WOMEN FROM COMMUNITIES OF COLOR. THEY WORK IN THE HOTELS AND DO AN EXCELLENT JOB. THEY'RE VERY PROFESSIONAL AND HARD WORKING. I WOULD NOT WANT TO SEE US BECAUSE THERE'S AN ECONOMIC DOWNTURN, I WOULDN'T WANT TO SEE US KIND OF CONTRACTING OUT A LOT OF THE SERVICES THAT ONCE WERE GOOD PAYING JOBS FOR WORKERS AND NOW WE'RE CONTRACTING IT OUT. SO I THINK IT'S STILL CRITICAL THAT WE CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THE HOTELS IN THE CITY AND THE WORK FORCE AS WELL. THEY REALLY REPRESENT BOSTON WELL AS THE HOTEL WORKERS AND THE WORKERS IN OUR RESTAURANTS ALSO. THE OTHER ONE I WANTED TO ASKED

THE OTHER ONE I WANTED TO ASKED ABOUT COUNCILLOR BOK, IS MAYBE GETTING AN UPDATE ON THE BCEC AND SEEING HOW TOURISM IS GOING AS A RESULT OF WHAT THEY'RE SEEING IN TERMS OF BOOKING IN THE CONVENTION CENTER.
WHAT SHORT TERM AND LONG-TERM ADJUSTMENTS THEY'RE MAKING OR WHAT THEY'RE SAYING OR HEARING FROM POTENTIAL COMPANIES THAT WANT TO RENT THE FACILITY.
I'M ALSO INTERESTED IN BECAUSE I REPRESENT LIKE YOU DO, COUNCILLOR BOK, THE HEINZ

CONVENTION CENTER. I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW WHAT THE STATUS IS OF THE POTENTIAL SALE OF THE HEINZ CONVENTION CENTER. BECAUSE THAT CERTAINLY HAS A MAJOR ECONOMIC IMPACT ON THE CITY OF BOSTON AND ESPECIALLY THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY IN THE BACK BAY AREA AS WELL. THE DOWNTOWN AREA. IT MAY ALSO HIRE A LOT OF LOCAL 26 WORKERS IN AND AROUND THAT AREA OF BOSTON. SO I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT THAT WORK FORCE THAT DOES AN EXCEPTIONAL JOB FOR OUR CITY AND OUR HOTELS, YOU KNOW, WE DO EVERYTHING THAT WE CAN FOR THOSE WORKERS. BECAUSE THOSE ARE EXCELLENT JOBS. WE NEED TO KEEP THOSE JOBS HERE IN THE CITY. AND MY FINAL POINT IS, I ALSO HAVE A LOT OF COMPANIES IN MY DISTRICT IN THE SEAFOOD INDUSTRY. SO I'D LIKE TO GET A LITTLE MORE INFORMATION ON WHAT THE IMPACT IS. ECONOMIC IMPACT IS ON THE SEAFOOD INDUSTRY IN AN AROUND THE SOUTH BOSTON WATER FRONT AREA, CHINA TOWN AREA HAS SOME SEAFOOD COMPANIES, THE SOUTH END. OTHER AREAS OF THE CITY ALSO DOES AS WELL. SO I'D LIKE TO TAKE A LOOK AT SOME OF THOSE ISSUES. BUT THANK YOU, COUNCILLOR BOK, FOR GIVING ME THE SECOND OPPORTUNITY TO ASK QUESTIONS. I APPRECIATE IT. >> THANK YOU, COUNCILLOR FLYNN. I VERY MUCH SHARE YOUR CONCERN ABOUT THE CONVENTION CENTER. COUNCILLOR O'MALLEY, MY FOLLOW-UP OUESTIONS? OKAY. ALL RIGHT. SEEING NONE, I'LL JUST ADD MY --I'LL COME BACK. DON'T WORRY.

SO THINKING ABOUT THINGS LIKE -I THINK WE SHOULD BE LOOKING
INTO HOTELS AS LIKE POTENTIAL
ISOLATION LOCATIONS FOR PEOPLE
WHO FIND OUT THAT THEY'RE COVID
POSITIVE AND THEY LIVE WITH
THEIR FAMILIES AND THEY DON'T
NEED HOSPITALIZATION BUT THEY
WOULD BE SAFER FOR EVERYBODY IN
THEIR HOUSEHOLD IF THEY HAD
SOMEWHERE ELSE TO STAY FOR TWO
WEEKS, A PRACTICE THAT HAS BEEN
DONE SUCCESSFULLY ALL OVER -- IN
OTHER COUNTRIES, WITH THIS
CRISIS, PAST CRISES.

THE OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO PAY OUR HOTEL WORKERS TO STAFF THAT KIND OF A CONTEXT WITH ALL THE RIGHT SAFETY PRECAUTIONS IS SOMETHING THAT WE SHOULD BE LOOKING INTO.

THAT'S THE TYPE OF THING THAT IN SOME PLACES THAT WE -GOVERNMENTS HAVE PROVIDED STIPENDS TO THE PEOPLE STAYING IN THOSE TEMPORARY ISOLATION HOTELS BECAUSE THE REALITY IS, PUBLIC HEALTH IS THE FACT THAT ALL OF OUR FATES ARE TIED TOGETHER.

SO WHEN PEOPLE GET SICK, IT'S ALL OF OUR PROBLEMS.

WE NEED TO THINK ABOUT A SUPPORT

SYSTEM THAT WILL LET US REOPEN

IN A WAY THAT IS SAFE FOR

EVERYBODY CONCERNED.

SO THINKING ABOUT HOW DOES

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT TIE IN WITH

THOSE PLANS IS IMPORTANT.

I AGREE WITH COUNCILLOR FLYNN.

WE NEED TO LOOK OUT FOR OUR

HOTEL AND CONVENTION WORKERS IN THIS CRISIS.

WE'LL NEED THEIR WORK ON THE OTHER SIDE AS WELL.

SO ALL RIGHT.

DOING AS A BODY.

I KNOW THE SHUT DOWN WAS TOUGH

ON FOLKS, BUT I'M JUST -- I HAD

A VERY STRONG REACTION TO A

LONGING FOR NORMAL OPERATION

GIVEN THE NORMAL OPERATIONS ARE

STEEPED IN EQUITY.

SO I WANT TO BE MINDFUL AS WE

MOVE FORWARD, WE HAVE TO DO SO

ALWAYS WITH A LENS TOWARDS

EQUITY.

SO EVEN IF IT'S NOT COVID

ABOUT THE DISRUPTION IN THAT

SOCIAL FABRIC, BUT I'M MINDFUL

THAT A LARGE SHARE OF THE

BUSINESSES MY DISTRICT MAY BE

DISPROPORTIONATELY THOSE TYPES

OF BUSINESSES AND THEREFORE

THEN, I'M CURIOUS ABOUT -- I'VE LEARNED A LOT IN THE LAST 100 SOMETHING DAYS ON THIS JOB. YOU KNOW, I THOUGHT IT WOULD BE SOMETHING AS SIMPLE IF WE'RE NOT SERVING CULTURAL CREWS, WHY NOT LOCAL RESTAURANTS IN THE CITY OF BOSTON TO PROVIDE MEALS TO STUDENTS OR HAVE THE FOOD THAT WOULD PROVIDING BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS BE MORE LOCAL. FROM WHAT I UNDERSTAND, THE CONTRACT IS GIVEN TO THIS

COMPANY CALLED REVOLUTION.

I GUESS THE FOOD COMES FROM I DON'T KNOW WHERE. I'M CURIOUS AS TO WHAT OPPORTUNITIES EXIST TO BREAK UP SOME OF THE FOOD VENDOR CONTRACTS SO THAT WE'RE SUPPORTING SMALLER BUSINESSES THE CITY OF BOSTON. WHERE DOES THAT STAND, WHAT ARE THE BARRIERS TO BEING ABLE TO MAKE THAT HAPPEN IN A REALLY --PUSHING TO FIGURE THAT OUT. I'M CURIOUS WHAT OPPORTUNITIES THE OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT EXISTS TO SUPPORT SMALLER ENTREPRENEURS TO BE ABLE TO PROVIDE THOSE SERVICES AS WELL. SO WHETHER YOU'RE DOING TAE KWON DO, WHETHER YOU'RE

TEACHING PEOPLE ABOUT YOGA,

THERE'S A LOT OF DIDN'T THINGS THAT ENTREPRENEURS ARE DOING IN THE CITY OF BOSTON THAT WEIGH MIGHT SUPPORTS THESE NONTRADITIONAL BUSINESSES, IF YOU WILL.

MANY OF WHICH ARE 1099 TO BE ABLE TO PROVIDE SERVICES TO THE CITY OF BOSTON.

LAST THING THAT I'D LIKE -- I DON'T KNOW WHO IS TAKING NOTES FOR YOUR TEAM, BUT I'M NOT -- I HOPE YOU ARE.

I WANT TO SEE THESE QUESTIONS ASKED.

IF NOT, I'LL ASK THEM IN THE HEARING.

THE OTHER QUESTION THAT I'M REALLY CURIOUS ABOUT IS, YOU KNOW, WE ALWAYS TALK ABOUT HOW THE CITY OF BOSTON IS HELPING SMALL BUSINESSES.

BUT I'D LOVE TO SEE A REPORT CARD, YOU KNOW.

I THINK IT WAS PRESIDENT COUNCIL JANEY TALKED ABOUT HOW MUCH -- I WOULD LOVE TO SEE IT IN THE

DASHBOARD, THE SCOPE OF WORK COMING OUT OF THAT DEPARTMENT.

I KEEP GOING BACK TO THE

CAPACITY AND THE RESOURCES THAT THEY NEED TO DO THESE THINGS. I THINK THAT WE WANT TO MANAGE EXPECTATIONS BUT I ALSO THINK IT'S IMPORTANT TO KNOW WHERE THE

SHORTFALLS ARE.

THE LAST PIECE IS THAT IN TERMS OF ASSESSMENT AND SURVEYS, JUST CURIOUS WHO IS AT THE TABLE AND FORMING OUR THINKING ABOUT WHAT ARE THE NEEDS OF SMALL BUSINESSES.

YOU KNOW, ASIDE FROM CONDUCTING A SURVEY, MAYBE PERHAPS COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS, I'M WONDERING HOW MUCH OF COMMUNITY VOICE IS AT PLAY WHEN IT COMES TO DESIGNING THE SUPPORT SERVICES THAT THEY'RE PROVIDING TO THE CITY OF BOSTON. I'M SORRY.
