School Meal Sites - Transition to Summer

- Currently in Boston, there are 74 meal sites.
- How do I find a site? www.boston.gov/departments/food-access/map-covid19-food-resources
- What will summer look like?
 - GOOD NEWS! USDA has waived the congregate and meal time standard requirements through August. Parents may also continue to pick up meals.
 - To date, the Y and OFA have recruited 30 community-based organizations to serve as sites. This is in addition to Y branches, BHA and BCYF sites.
 - Last year BPS had 120 sites, but there was programming at these locations. More to come soon.

- Bilingual staff & Language Line (160 languages)
- Services -
 - SNAP screening & application assistance
 - Referrals to local food resources, including school/summer meals sites, WIC, food pantries, home delivered meals, etc.
 - Coordinating with OFA on delivery for Boston residents
 - State's information hub for P-EBT & HIP
- Our daily call volume is 6x higher we have brought on new staff and created a separate P-EBT line

Massachusetts P-EBT - 800-645-8333

- P-EBT is a cash benefit for all MA school age students who are enrolled in free or reduced-price (f/r) school meals.
- All Boston Public School students are receiving P-EBT. METCO students will receive P-EBT if they receive f/r meals at the school they attend.
- The benefit was either uploaded to a family's EBT card (if they are a DTA client)
 or families will receive individual P-EBT cards for each eligible student last week
 and this week.
- Two issuances of \$199.50 per eligible student.



- Friends of GBFB donate time, money and resources.
- Team GBFB and volunteers acquire, sort, and deliver 60+ million pounds of healthy food, enough for 50+ million healthy meals.
- 500+ partner agencies get the majority of their food from GBFB.





- 1. **Representation:** Determines how many seats each state has in the US House of Representatives and therefore influence in the Electoral College
- 2. **Redistricting:** Congressional districts, state legislative districts, and local city council districts are redrawn for the next ten years
- 3. Federal Funding: \$16 Billion in Federal Funding for Massachusetts
 - a. Much of this funding helps the most vulnerable among us, providing, for instance, health care, education, food and nutrition programs, housing, and child care for low-income families
 - Medicaid, Medicare, SNAP, Section 8 Vouchers, Title 1 Education Grants, Head Start, CDBG
 - ii. For every resident who is not counted in MA, \$2,372 in funding is missed

- Protections from Title 13 of the U.S.
 Code
 - Lifetime sworn obligation to never disclose information identifying individual or business
 - Your answers cannot be used against you by any government agency or court
 - Violation a federal crime; federal prison sentence up to 5 years, \$250,000 fine, or both

- •Census Bureau **never** asks for:
 - Social Security number
 - Bank account number
 - Credit card number
 - Money or donations





4 ways to be counted:

- Online, Phone, Paper Form (Today-October 31)
- In-person canvasser visit (August 11-Octber 31)

Service-Based Enumeration

- People without conventional housing and people who may be experiencing homelessness (emergency and transitional shelters, soup kitchens, pre-identified outdoor locations)
- Date TBA:
 - July 30, July 31, August 1- with Temporary Non Shelter Outdoor Living (TNSOL) happening August 1
 - September 29, September 30, October 1 with TNSOL happening October 1

Massachusetts Food Trust Program

Boston Food Access Council Presentation

What is the MFTP?

- The Massachusetts Food Trust Program (MFTP) is a state-wide initiative that provides loans, grants, and business assistance for increasing access to healthy, affordable food in low-income, underserved areas.
- Maximum loan amount is \$300K and the maximum grant is \$25,000.
- While the loans typically have a maturity of between 3 and 5 years and an interest rate of around 4%. Longer maturities are available for real estate transactions.



COVID-19 Adaptations

- To respond to the current health and economic crisis, we are continuing to accept new applications, award grants and offer 0% interest loans for the first 6-12 months through July 31, 2020 for qualified candidates.
- The funds can be used towards to pay for activities related to COVID -19, including but not limited to increasing inventory, purchase additional equipment, and serve the organization's other most immediate needs.



How do I qualify?

- Provide or support the availability of high-quality, affordable, and nutritious food in an area where there is limited access
- Serve a majority of customers from underserved areas
- Demonstrate strong engagement and support from local residents and a commitment to providing a positive economic and social impact to the local community*
- Accept federal and state benefits (e.g. SNAP & WIC) to the maximum extent possible
- Include an experienced manager on the team, ideally with a minimum of three years managing a similar healthy food project
- Work with other state and local programs to the maximum extent practicable
- Be financially sustainable

We're on a mission to build a new food economy grounded in **racial**, **social** and **economic justice**.

PRE-COVID:

- SHARED KITCHENS: 50+ divers food businesses; 75% owned by women, immigrants & people of color; employing 160+
- BUSINESS & TECHNICAL SUPPORT: 25+ workshops and webinars annually to 100+ businesses on costing, marketing, bookkeeping, distribution, etc;
- MARKET ACCESS: partnerships with retailers, corporate dining and college and hospital food service, plus operate our own take-out kiosk in Kendall Sq;
- CONTRACT MANUFACTURING: 30+ product companies, farms, and restaurant partners contract with CWK for outsourced processing; plus CWK has its own products sold to institutional markets;
- IMPACTS: 60+ alumni businesses still in operation; 500+ jobs created; over \$55M+ in annual gross revenue;
- SOCIAL ENTERPRISE MODEL: Over 40% of CWK's annual budget is generated from earned income from kitchen operations- more than \$1.2M/year.

Since March 2020:

- Over 70% of member businesses temporarily shuttered
- Over \$1.2M of projected earned revenue from operations evaporated overnight- 40% of our annual budget











When you have more than you need build a longer table, not a higher fence.

In April 2020, CWK launched **CommonTable**, an effort to mobilize our diverse community of restaurants, food trucks, bakers, product companies, distributors and farmers to feed our neighbors in need.







CORE PRINCIPLES:

- · Equity at the center
- · Distribute opportunity
- · Prioritize local sourcing
- Leverage CWK's kitchens for BULK production
- Stay in our lane/ leverage strategic partnerships to identify needs
- Address urgent needs, with an eye toward the future

CommonTable program elements

BULK PREPARED MEALS

- Prepared meals produced by CWK, JMiH, & FFG; (\$7/meal)
- Ingredients sourced from local farms & fisheries whenever possible
- Approximately 45k meals through May; 26K meals/month

MEAL KITS

- EatWell meal kits-\$3/serving
- Each kit includes protein, produce, starch, premeasured spices, & a recipe
- 10-12K servings/month

RESTAURANT PARTNERS

- Off Their Plate: CWK fiscal agent, paying restaurants to feed front-line healthcare workers (\$10/meal)
- CommonTable: paying minority and immigrant-owned restaurants to produce prepared meals to feed neighbors; (\$10/meal); + business TA
- CommonTable Grocer: Paying restaurants to produce custom grocery bags (i.e. produce, rice, beans, masa, avocados) (\$45 per 30# box- 10-12 servings)
- 10K+ meals/grocery servings distributed through May

CommonTable projected impacts

Between April-August 2020:

- 200,000+ meals & grocery bags delivered to families in need at 30 sites across Greater Boston
- 40 restaurants, food trucks, and caterers engaged- 90% owned by immigrants or people of color
- 80+ people re-employed, at wages of \$15-20/hr
- 200,000+ lbs. of local produce integrated into program





Total projected cost: \$2.25M (April-Aug)
Commitments to date: \$1.2M (55%)


