ORDER FOR A HEARING REGARDING THE BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT'S GANG DATABASE

WHEREAS: The Boston Regional Intelligence Center (BRIC) of the Boston Police

Department (BPD) maintains a database of suspected gang involved persons in

the City of Boston; and

WHEREAS: According to reports from 2019, the database contained 5,300 individuals, including

2,800 individuals classified as "active" members and 2,500 classified as "inactive";

and

WHEREAS: BPD and BRIC use an arbitrary point system to determine a person's suspected

gang involvement and affiliation; and

WHEREAS: BPD Field Investigation and Observation (FIO) data released earlier this year

demonstrates that Black and Brown Bostonians are disproportionately stopped by police, which, in turn, adds more points to an individual's gang database record;

and

WHEREAS: 2019 data from the gang database shows that Black and Brown Bostonians are

dramatically and disproportionately represented in the gang database, with over

90% of all individuals in the database classified Black or Latinx; and

WHEREAS: Since 2019, the gang database has stopped collecting information regarding the

race of individuals; and

WHEREAS: There is a lack of transparency and accountability with regards to publicly

available data, the ability to request personal information from BRIC, information sharing with other law enforcement agencies, and the separation of federal, state, and

local law enforcement; NOW THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED: That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a

hearing to discuss the structure of the Boston Police Department's gang database, its

rubric, its effectiveness, and how it impacts the lives of those named within.

Representatives from BPD, advocacy groups, legal assistance organizations, as well

as other relevant and interested parties shall be invited to attend.
