Process Summary
<p>Tufts University's Government and Community Relations office collected data on programs, volunteer efforts, donations, and services that faculty, staff, and students provided to the City of Boston and/or its residents during calendar year 2020. This includes financial aid grants for students from Boston that are solely based on need. The data on the following pages is separated by schools and departments. For volunteer service, the dollar value was calculated using the Independent Sector's 2020 valuation (\$27.20/hour). This report does not include salaries paid to residents of the City of Boston (591 employees, \$42,488,350 as of 11/20) and property taxes paid to the City of Boston in 2020 (\$43,258.06).</p> <p>Tufts University's total benefits contribution to the City of Boston is \$9,315,547.</p>

<p>Tisch College Community Research Center Grant - Tufts University Prison Initiative</p>	<p>The Tufts University Prison Initiative of Tisch College (TUPIT)'s college-in-prison program has begun crucial rehabilitation work inside state prisons, and developed a re-entry component called TERN (Tufts Educational Re-entry Network) to address the urgent issue of reentry. Led through a partnership with individuals with lived experiences of incarceration, including a former inside TUPIT student, TERN developed an educational program for people who have recently been released from prison, to foster skills and increase employability. In fall 2020, combined with an inside-out class taught by the TUPIT Program director, MyTERN provided training for certifications in basic computer proficiency from the Microsoft Office suite on Google Chromebooks - provided by TERN. The computer proficiency module is taught by volunteer TUPIT Student Coordinators, under the supervision of the TUPIT-TERN Director (Hilary Binda). A TCRC student grant supported the Student Program Director (Claudia Guetta) of MyTERN on 2 aspects of this program: - Coordination and training of student volunteers.
