# Public Health Accreditation and Planning Efforts





#### What is Accreditation?

- The measurement of health department performance against a set of nationally recognized, practice-focused and evidenced-based standards
- The issuance of recognition of achievement of accreditation within a specified time frame by a nationally recognized entity (Public Health Accreditation Board—PHAB)
- The continual development, revision, and distribution of public health standards
- Voluntary; fee associated





- ► Create community-led engagement teams\*



#### SERVICE NAVIGATION

- ► Expand drop-in problem-solving
- ► Create access to web-based resource list \*
- ▶ Increase access to low-threshold daytime spaces\*



#### LOW-THRESHOLD SHELTER + HOUSING

- ▶ Provide new model of low-threshold, transitional shelter + housing at six sites in Boston through FY23\*
- ► Launch Shelter Transformation – Phase 1



#### PERMANENT HOUSING

 Increase access to rapid re-housing



#### REDUCTION

- ► Expand access to medications for opioid use disorder at low-threshold shelter + housing sites




## Boston SARS-CoV-2 Wastewater Surveillance

- Set up early warning and monitoring system for COVID-19 in communities and neighborhoods across Boston
- Contract awarded to Biobot, Cambridge MA
- Wastewater sampling two times a week from 11 manhole sites across the city
- Scheduled to start 10/10
- Sites: Allston/Brighton, Charlestown, East Boston, Back Bay, South Boston, Jamaica Plain, Dorchester 02122, 02124, Mattapan, Hyde Park, Roslindale/West Roxbury, Roxbury



# BPHC study on masking supports protective benefits of masking in Boston Public Schools









## Monkeypox Virus (MPV) Update



## MPV Epidemiological summary, as of 9/6/22

- A total of 136 cases among Boston residents reported via Massachusetts Virtual Epidemiologic Network (MAVEN)
- Demographic characteristics:
  - All **male** gender
  - Median age: 35
  - **Neighborhoods** with highest # of cases
    - Dorchester
    - South End
    - East Boston
    - Jamaica Plain
    - Roxbury
    - Fenway
- Clinical characteristics
  - # of MPV cases referred for TPOXX antiviral treatment: 57
  - # of deaths: 0





- Consider TPOXX if you are experiencing severe pain or have lesions near your eyes, mouth, rectum, or urethra.
- TPOXX may help ease symptoms, control pain, and shorten the length of illness.
- TPOXX is available for free with a prescription.



## MPV Epidemiological Summary, as of 9/6/22


# and % race/ethnicity of monkeypox virus (MPV) cases in Boston, June-Sept 2022, n=136

#### CAN'T STAY INSIDE? FOLLOW THESE TIPS.



- Fully cover your rash and sores with clothing or bandages.
