Acquired by the City of Boston in 1923, the Park and Playground are 100 years old!


The historic character of the neighborhood carries through the park in the form of rolling lawns and an abundance of mature trees.

# An Evolving Park




1870

Early maps of the area depict the dramatic topography still evident on site today



1874

In the late 1800s, the road network and buildings surrounding the site were not yet fully constructed. Columbia road had not yet been realigned

This map depicts the neighborhood 10 years after the City of Boston acquired the park in 1923






By the mid 1900s a large open sports field, a pool, and restrooms shaped the site













Consistent slopes and large trees frame key views throughout the park.






