The Office of Youth Employment and Opportunity (YEO) ensures that Boston's youth are equipped to transition successfully into adulthood through short-term youth employment, skill development and career readiness opportunities.

SuccessLink, the City's youth employment program, is a critical component of advancing this work. Led by YEO, the program is designed to recruit and hire youth for engaging and meaningful employment experiences that advance their professional and personal development.

Moreover, youth jobs have the potential to <u>reduce economic inequality by increasing access to early employment experiences for low-income and disadvantaged youth.</u>

This City year, the made unprecedented \$18.7M investment to expand the SuccessLink Summer Youth Employment program. YEO partnered with 200+ nonprofit organizations, City agencies, and lead youth employment providers, including Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD), the Boston Private Industry Council (PIC), John Hancock, and Youth Options Unlimited (YOU) Boston to successfully employ 9000+ young Bostonians in summer 2023.



Engagement and outreach is critical to ensuring the full participation of Boston's youth in the summer jobs program.

YEO's Engagement and Outreach team is dedicated to increasing awareness of the youth workforce and career development opportunities available. The team connects youth to summer employment opportunities by conducting city-wide outreach, hosting community engagement and recruitment events, and recording data on program needs and outcomes.

This year, the team revived the Youth Job and Resource Fair, hosting it for the first time since the pandemic. This annual event is crucial to connecting youth to employers, job readiness resources, and job application assistance. As a result of the team's strategic engagement and outreach efforts, the job fair was a great success. 2000+ teens were in attendance. The Engagement and Outreach team also successfully connected 900+ young people to summer jobs through seven neighborhood job fairs that were created to target youth in communities that are typically underrepresented and underserved.

Additionally, YEO conducted office hours to assist youth with job applications resulting in 180+ teens landing a summer job.

Ensuring our youth are successful in the workforce goes beyond securing employment.

It is critical that youth are supported every step of the way from learning job search skills to knowing their rights as youth workers. YEO's Workforce Development team works to equip young people for employment through job readiness and professional development workshops which covers various topics including resumebuilding, interviewing, and worker's rights. Additionally, they conducted specialized workshops where youth can explore different industries and learn how to successfully choose a career path. For example, they hosted a series of Find Your SPARK workshops, which allowed youth to focus on self-reflection, motivation, and goal setting to discover the intent behind their career choices.

Another workshop series. titled Entrepreneurial Exploration, was held in collaboration with the Network Teaching Entrepreneurship where youth receive nine hours of training entrepreneurship. The team also hosted a Career Exploration workshop series to help youth recognize personal strengths and challenges when designing their career paths. Following a recent workshop, 82% of attendees felt more prepared to make healthy and responsible career decisions.
