

- If this is a building owner's first year of BERDO reporting, they must also complete third-party verification by May 15, 2024

2. Submit additional basic questions in the Google Form:

- Contact info and organizational info
- Project name and total amount being requested
- An acknowledgement and accepting of terms and certification of submitted data

- Overview of the proposed project

A public meeting is generally defined as "a deliberation by a public body with respect to any matter within the body's jurisdiction."

Questions to help determine whether a communication of any medium constitutes a deliberation subject to the law:

- ¹⁾ Is the communication between or among members of a **public body**?
- ²⁾ If so, is the communication among **a quorum?**
- ³⁾ Does the communication involve a matter within the body's **jurisdiction**?
- ⁴⁾ If so, does the communication fall within an **exception** listed in the law?

What's Required from a Public Meeting?

Public meetings must:



Make a public notice of meeting at least 48 hours in advance



Create an agenda and allow public attendance



Create and maintain accurate minutes of all meetings
