Community Meeting #2 Summary

1. Franklin Park Project Updates

- Current Franklin Park Projects:
 - o Wilderness: Restoring pathways and picnic tables.
 - o **Glen Road**: Addressing debris from cross-country path; work planned for spring.
 - Bear Dens: Property is now in the care and custody of the City of Boston. Safety repairs to start this spring.
 - o **Ellicott Arch**: structural review, safety lighting and vegetation management.

• Franklin Park Action Plan:

o Initiating priority projects including dog park studies, traffic calming on Circuit Drive, and conceptual designs for the overlook.

2. Tennis Complex Expansion

- Proposed Designs:
 - Expanding from 2 to 4 or 5 courts.
 - o Plans include fencing, lighting, shaded seating, pathways, and benches.

• Feedback:

- Boston Public Schools (BPS) use can be accommodated with little impact on Franklin Park Tennis or community use.
- The five-court expansion was unanimously preferred by the community at the meeting.
- o Can pickleball striping be added? Several community members and the BPS coach have concerns with adding.



- Can blue lines be added for youth tennis?
- Will the lights be able to be used year-round?
- The park is open dawn to dusk, how can the courts be used beyond that?
- Can the pathway north of the courts be retained?
- The tennis courts are a social space, maintain space for people to set up their own chairs outside of the courts.
- o 10' tall fencing is desired around the perimeter of the courts.
- No picnicking should be allowed on the courts.

3. Accessibility and Amenities

Pathways:

- Retaining primary paths.
- Exploring rerouting the east/west path north of the tennis court expansion.
- Concern about ATV access, but pathways need to meet ADA, which are similar widths that ATV need.

Shade Structures:

- Proposed near courts and picnic areas.
- Design focus on minimal maintenance and historical context.
- o Community didn't think shade structure by road would be used.

Amenities:

- Water fountains, seating, and bike racks to be installed.
- Prefer to add some hot coal bins and fixed grills for picnics.
- o Tennis needs a bulletin board, storage, and practice wall.

Restrooms:

- Not included in the current project scope but discussed as a future priority by the community.
- Options could include portable toilets with enclosures.

Feedback

- Parking and Traffic:
- Retaining parallel parking due to road width limitations.
- Suggestions to improve pedestrian access from parking areas.
- Lighting and Safety:



- o Concerns about light pollution affecting birds and wildlife.
- Requests for emergency call boxes in the park.
- Historical and Cultural Considerations:
- o Recognition of significant park landmarks and individuals (e.g., Henry Page).
- Interest in dedicating courts or benches to local contributors; further discussion to take place at meeting #3.

4. Timeline and Funding

Schedule:

- o Final design and permitting expected by late winter 2025.
- Construction planned to start post-Juneteenth, aiming for completion by summer 2026.

Funding:

o Project funded through city capital improvement program.

5. Next Steps

- Mark proposed court perimeters on site for community review.
- Study alternative pathways north of tennis courts.
- Clarify restroom options.
- Refine lighting and fencing plans with updated community input.
- BPRD to look into court numbering and court naming.
- Share inventory of City of Boston tennis and pickleball facilities, see attached.
- Consider adding emergency call box, tennis storage, and bulletin board to program.
- Schedule the next community meeting to present finalized designs.

One of the attendees' letters after the meeting:

"Greetings and thank you for allowing my input. Franklin Park has helped me through many problems with stress using tennis. Even though my game has not been that good, Jennie can attest to that.

After severing Boston as a police officer on the overnight shift, I would go to the tennis courts by the Shattuck Hospital and hit off the rebound wall; if you don't believe me, ask the patients who complained about me.

I serve on three boards: Roxbury Main Streets, Brookline Community TV, and, Community Wellness Advisory Board, at Sportsmen Tennis Club. Yes, I am retired, a veteran, but Boston is my love. Boston allows access to so many services, the best schools, the best hospitals and yes, the best Park: Franklin Park, Zoo and Golf course.

My concerns are these, first, did you know that at one time there were twenty-six tennis courts in Franklin Park, and I believe, the northeastern corner of the tennis courts at Shattuck are the ashes of first Black Tennis pro, Henry Paige; Henry taught Doctors and Nurses tennis in their off-time hours. Also, in light of the fires around the country, what safeguards are in the planning, with the Park, Zoo, homes and next to it, a research lab?


