

Naming Process Recap



• Past Events:

- January 2024: The Merger Community Engagement Team met to discuss a process for name suggestions after reviewing the District Naming Policy.
- March 2024: Using the Community Engagement Team's (CET) feedback we shared a drafted School Renaming process for name submissions with CET.
- May 2024: Hosted a community meeting to launch the Naming process and invite suggestions.
- June-October 2024: Advertised and accepted name suggestions at all three school buildings and across Roslindale.
- December 2024: Hosted a Joint School Site Council Meeting to accept name suggestions and for the SSC to narrow the list down to 7 possible name options.
- December 2024-January 2025: Shared a survey for the school communities to narrow down the list from 7 to 3 name options.

What's Next:

- **February 2025:** Host a Public Hearing for the SSC to vote on a final name suggestion.
- February 2025: Present the final name suggestion to the Boston School Committee.
- March 2025: School Committee Final Vote

- Thomas M. Menino Elementary School


We ran the survey from Friday, December 20, 2024 until Friday, January 24, 2025.

We received 303 responses!






Relationship to School






Race and Ethnicity



Philbrick-Sumner Naming Survey - Final Community Votes



Community Naming Survey Results

The <u>top 3 names</u> as voted on by the Philbrick-Sumner School Communities:

- Anna Mae Cole School
- Roslindale Elementary School
- Sarah Roberts Elementary School



Sarah Roberts Elementary School

In 1847, Benjamin Roberts applied to the Boston Primary School Committee for his daughter, five year-old Sarah Roberts, to attend a school that educated White children closer to their home. The Committee denied his request four times. Charles Sumner represented the Roberts family.

"We believe this name will also honor both Charles Sumner and John Philbrick. In 1849, Sarah was 5 years old. Her daddy Benjamin wanted her to go to a great school near their house. But they had a problem. Sarah was supposed to go to a different school that was for African American children. That wasn't fair. Charles Sumner was a lawyer who fought for equal rights. He argued for Sarah's constitutional right to go to the school close to her house, all the way to the Supreme Court of Massachusetts. They didn't win, BUT activists kept fighting. And 6 years later in 1855, segregated public schools in Massachusetts were abolished. The year after that, John Philbrick became Superintendent of Boston Schools. He is famous because he introduced grades instead of one room schoolhouses! To conclude, John Philbrick was a revolutionary educator and presided over Boston Schools at the dawn of their desegregation. Charles Sumner kept fighting for equal rights for other African American citizens like Sarah, across the United States - and nearly lost his life for it. Honoring Sarah Roberts keeps our history as the Sumner and Philbrick schools alive, AND it adds to the small number of BPS schools named after women and African American historical figures. Please vote for Sarah Roberts! It's time she won!"



Roslindale Elementary School

The merged school is in the neighborhood of Roslindale.

"There have been schools named after various Boston neighborhoods including: West Roxbury, East Boston, Dorchester, Mattapan, Charlestown, and more. And I often wondered why, living in Roslindale, there was not a school named after this great neighborhood. And I do mean great. Roslindale is a wonderful community, home to many great people, and has a rich history and background. Roslindale Square is the center and a beacon of this neighborhood, and we are welcoming to all. In my research, I found that there was a Roslindale High School that was renamed West Roxbury High School back in 1977, which was almost 50 years ago. I think it's time that we bring that pride, recognition, and identity back to this neighborhood, the neighborhood of Roslindale by the name of the school: the Roslindale Elementary School. Is it simple? Yes, but sometimes simple options work well. As part of this proposal, I would also recommend that we take the three schools that are part of this merger, the Philbrick and Sumner communities and the Irving building, and choose three pillars of our new community, the auditorium, the library, and the gymnasium to name it after these three individuals and keep their spirits, contributions, and life work alive."



Anna Mae Cole School

Anna M. Cole has been a Matriarch of the Bromley/Mildred C. Hailey community for many decades. Her work has transformed the fight for affordable housing across the nation. Anna Cole was a school crossing guard who worked hard for affordable housing in Boston and has touched the lives of many people. She has a community center named after her which was transformed into a testing site for COVID for two years.

"As we consider building a school community, I think it makes sense to consider a community leader whose life exemplifies service, advocacy, and community building. Throughout her life, Anna Cole has demonstrated a deep commitment to the well-being of children and families in Boston. In addition to being a crossing school guard well into her 80s, she was instrumental in providing free breakfast to children facing food insecurity, and she organized events like movie nights and barbecues, offering safe and inclusive spaces for families to come together. In addition to her community building efforts, Cole was a tireless advocate for tenants rights in Boston, fighting for affordable housing and better living conditions. Cole's work highlights the power of grassroots organizing and the impact of individuals dedicated themselves to uplifting their neighbors. Her ability to bring people together and address critical community needs demonstrates that leadership comes in many forms and it can start right in your own neighborhood."

Naming Criteria to Consider

The <u>District Naming Policy</u> Lists Criteria to Consider When Recommending/ Adopting Official Names for Schools. School names may:

- Honor a person who has made a significant contribution or given outstanding service to the school, the school system, the nation, or society
- Recognize the geographic section of the city in which the school is located
- Recognize the academic theme of the school
- Might combine the name of a person who has made a significant contribution to the school, the school system or the community and that of an academic theme.
