

Our city teams have worked every day to make Boston a home for everyone since Mayor Wu took office. Here's some of what we accomplished together.

#### **HOUSING & DEVELOPMENT**

- 300 new affordable homes built for first-time homebuyers, with 500 more under construction
- 600 units of new housing for seniors built, with nearly 300 more under construction and another 400 funded and ready to build
- 1,000 units of BHA housing under construction
- Launched the Boston Acquisition Fund (BAF), a public-private revolving loan fund, to protect families and support mission-driven developers in purchasing occupied multi-family housing in the city\*
- Permanently protected 347 homes at the Fairlawn Apartments in Mattapan with support from the BAF
- Announced an expansion of the office-to-residential conversion program to include universities and employers looking to reactivate office buildings as dorms or workforce housing
- Created the Boston Planning Department, accountable to the people of Boston, restoring planning as a core City function\*
- <u>Changed Mattapan zoning in</u> response to residents, now the number of projects that require a variance from the Zoning Board of

- Appeals is down by two-thirds, while applications that meet the zoning code fully are up 30%
- Cut the permitting timeline for projects by 20% in Squares & Streets neighborhoods
- Removed barriers for residents to build ADUs citywide, and supported local contractors in getting them built\*
- Announced the launch of the Copurchasing Housing Pilot Program during speech
- · Announced the City's first Anti-Displacement Action Plan during speech

#### **BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

- BPS is growing enrollment for the first time in a decade
- BPS educators won Massachusetts Teacher of the Year, Assistant Principal of the Year, and School Counselor of the Year
- MCAS scores are improving
- Received the largest grant in the history of the Boston Public Schools, \$38M from Bloomberg Philanthropies to double the size of the Edward M Kennedy Academy for health careers, in partnership with our city's largest employer, Mass General Brigham\*
- Launched Zum, an app for families to view bus assignments, receive alerts about delays, and live-track students' rides for the very first time

- <u>Launched a new partnership between</u> the Ruth Batson Academy and the University of Massachusetts Boston UMass flew students to the Vatican for a climate summit, brought guest speakers onto campus, and is now supporting full scholarships for RBA graduates to study education
- Launched "Great Starts," a one-stop online portal to help families find childcare options\*
- More than 50,000 Boston students and their guests have already enjoyed free visits through Boston Family Days\*
- Mayor Wu announced that BPS will stand up new advanced math programs
- Renovating White Stadium into a world-class athletics hub guaranteed for BPS students, coaches, and residents 15 hours a day, more than 345 days of the year
- Reached tentative agreement with Boston Teachers' Union on a threeyear contract
- Taught more than 500 children to bike, built ten new gardens with BPS, and provided swim lessons to 3,500 young swimmers as part of the Mayor's Connect Learn Explore Program

## ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY, WORKER EMPOWERMENT & CITY CONTRACTING

- Awarded over \$150 million contracts to businesses owned by people of color
- Added 225 liquor licenses, with support from the Council, Legislature, and the Governor
- <u>Launched the SCALE Program</u> to provide grants and technical assistance to local businesses, helping to build their capacity to compete for more and bigger contracts\*
- Expanded Open Streets
- Guaranteed a summer job to every BPS student who wanted one, providing over 10,000 jobs\*

## COMMUNITY HEALTH & SAFETY

- The first ever Boston Fire cadet class will be graduating this year
- Opening the paid detail system for residents to serve as civilian flaggers following a historic police union contract\*
- Lowest year for incidents of gunfire since we began tracking this data more than a decade ago

#### **BASIC CITY SERVICES**

- Reopened the Mattahunt with the asbestos gone, and the space fully accessible, with new floors and windows, a dedicated teen room, and a freshly-painted gym complete with a scoreboard
- Cut the ribbon on the <u>new Engine 17</u> firehouse on <u>Meetinghouse Hill</u>, which the City allocated \$30 million to invest in the wellbeing of Boston firefighters\*

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

 Partnered with <u>Google to optimize</u> <u>traffic signal timing and improve</u> <u>traffic flow</u> in highly congested areas and key intersections\*

#### **ARTS & CULTURE**

- Announced BCYF Creates, an investment in free, high-quality arts programming offered at Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF) community centers for youth ages 8-14 during speech
- Announced \$3 million in funding from
   The Monuments Project at the Mellon
   Foundation to make a historic investment in arts and programming in Boston's public spaces during speech

#### **ENVIRONMENT & PARKS**

- 95 electric school buses ready the start of the next school year
- Executed the largest installation of green roofs on bus shelters anywhere in the country
- Boston was the only American city invited by his Holiness Pope Francis to present at the Vatican last summer
- Received a \$10 million grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to build out green jobs and enhance climate and coastal resilience across Boston neighborhoods
- <u>It's Electric installed its first on-</u> <u>street EV charger</u>
- Announced <u>Boston Energy Saver</u>, a
   <u>historic new partnership with</u>

   <u>Eversource and National Grid</u> that
   will secure more than \$150 million in
   state funding for residents to
   upgrade their homes and lower their
   bills, during speech

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#### **HOUSING & DEVELOPMENT**

- More than 850 residents become first time homeowners with assistance from the City
- More than 11,000 new units of housing built, with more than 3,000 affordable—the most in at least 25 years
- 6,000 more units permitted, with another 13,000 in the pipeline ready to go
- Worked with partners to acquire more than <u>700 homes</u> in the last 3 years
- Received applications to create 760
  new apartments since the launch of
  the office-to-residential pilot
  program in October 2023, with at
  least 1,000 units expected to be
  under construction by next summer
  in the Downtown neighborhood\*
- Rezoned more of Boston over the last two years than the past twenty years combined\*

#### **BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

<u>Championed investments in early</u>
 education to expand Boston's
 <u>Universal Pre-K (UPK) program</u> with
 close to 5,000 three- and four-year
 olds participating

# ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY, WORKER EMPOWERMENT & CITY CONTRACTING

- Closed nearly all union contracts, settling all of them over the table, cutting reliance on outside management attorneys by 90% within the first year and a half
- Grown the number of contracts with businesses owned by women or people of color by almost 50%

### COMMUNITY HEALTH & SAFETY

- Became the safest major city in the country
- Saw 160 overdose deaths of Boston residents in the first 8 months of 2021, compared to 123 overdose deaths in the first eight months of 2024 - that is a 23% decline
- Seen a decline in incidents of gun violence and in the number of people directly impacted by gun violence for the fourth consecutive year

#### **BASIC CITY SERVICES**

- Opened 9 pools and cut the ribbon on 20 parks and playgrounds since 2021.
- Resolved over 570,000 311 requests, repaired more than 30 miles of sidewalk and more than 60 miles of roadway, filling 15,000 potholes and relighting 11,000 streetlights

• Expanded Boston Public Library services by 10,000 hours

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

• The <u>23, 28, and 29 buses continue to</u> be fare-free

#### **ARTS & CULTURE**

Neighborhood and Downtown
 Activation Grants have provided \$3.9 million in 2024 to 92 grantees to support the creation of over 100 free community-focused arts, cultural, and creative activations in public spaces that foster joy, strengthen community wellbeing, and advance placemaking across Boston neighborhoods

#### **ENVIRONMENT & PARKS**

- Saved <u>residents and businesses more</u> than \$260 million on energy costs in the four years since the launch of the Boston Community Choice Energy program
- Planted more than 5,000 street trees along neighborhood streets
- Home to more than 300 climate tech companies
- East Boston and South Boston are the place where living sea walls—an Earthshot prize winning idea—are first being piloted
