





Ways to Improve

AWARDED PROJECTS WILL:

- ✓ Reduce or eliminate local sources of air pollution
- ✓ Mitigate health impacts of air pollution exposure, focusing on vulnerable populations
- ✓ Enhance the capacity of communities or businesses to monitor, reduce, or prevent air pollution
- ✓ Deliver measurable improvements in air quality or reductions in greenhouse gas emissions
- ✓ Support Boston's goal of carbon neutrality by 2050



FUNDING

WHAT

- Nonprofit organization may apply for funding ranging from \$2,000-\$200,000.
- \$1,000,000 is allocated for the entire 2025 program.

HOW

• The Air Pollution Control Commission (APCC) oversees programs that promote clean air and reduce pollution in Boston. This grant program is funded by the Pollution Abatement Fund and supports nonprofit organizations leading community-based projects to improve air quality and reduce carbon emissions while raising awareness of environmental and public health challenges. Funded projects contribute to Boston's goal of carbon neutrality by 2050 and deliver benefits to neighborhoods most affected by air pollution.



GRANT TIMELINE



INELIGIBLE TOPICS

To ensure this grant program fills critical funding gaps, we will not fund projects that already have multiple dedicated grant opportunities at the city, state, or federal level.




LANGUAGE ACCESS

COMMUNITY CLEAN AIR GRANT PROGRAM

The City of Boston wants to fund community-driven projects to improve local air quality and public health.





APPLICATION PROCESS

Submission Evaluation Awarding



SUBMISSION

ELIGIBILITY

While the City encourages partnerships between nonprofits, businesses, researchers, and more, a **nonprofit organization** must serve as the lead applicant and fiscal sponsor for all proposals.

Projects must be located within the City of Boston.

PARTNERSHIPS

The City strongly encourages partnerships to maximize impact.

MULTIPLE SUBMISSIONS

Applicants may submit more than one proposal.

However, a maximum of one project per organization will be awarded per fiscal year.

PREPARE TO APPLY

PROPOSAL FOCUS

- ✓ Eliminate or otherwise address local sources of air pollution;
- ✓ Mitigate the negative health impacts of air pollution emissions;
- ✓ Enhance the ability of local communities to monitor, reduce, or prevent air pollution;
- ✓ Have a measurable impact on air quality or carbon emissions.

BUDGET

The program will award grants ranging from \$2,000 to \$200,000 per project, with a total of \$1 million in available funding.

- Up to 10% of the grant budget can cover indirect/administrative costs
- There is no cap on budgeted staff time that directly supports project goals

TIMELINE

Project timelines should ideally be completed within **one year**.

However, proposals with a duration of **up to two years** may be considered if the extended timeline is justified by the project's potential impact.

VENDOR ID

To apply, you need to become a registered vendor with the City of Boston and have received your **vendor ID**.

OPTIONAL PRELIMINARY PROPOSAL

- If you'd like to receive formal feedback on your proposal prior to the application deadline, please submit a preliminary proposal using the provided <u>template</u>.
 - 1. Make a copy of the template document.
 - 2. Complete all sections.
 - 3. Email your submission to <u>apcc@boston.gov</u> **by April 15, 2025.**
 - Include "Community Clean Air Grant Preliminary Proposal" in the subject line.
 - Proposals must include all requested attachments, including the budget attachment.
- Complete submissions will be reviewed and will receive feedback by May 1, 2025.



APPLY ON WIZEHIVE

You can preview the application prior to starting your application draft. Once
you begin the application, you will be able to save your progress and return to
your draft to continue working.



- Application sections can be completed in any order you prefer.
- The application submission deadline is on Thursday, May 15, 2025 at 4:00 PM.



EVALUATION



CRITERIA

- Scope
- Work Plan
- Team



COMMITTEE

- Environment Department staff
- Representatives from other City departments

PROCESS

- The committee makes the final decision on who is awarded
- All applicants are notified on funding decisions



AWARDING



NOTIFICATION

- Application updates will be sent via email to the Profile Owner who manages your Organization's Profile
- If selected for an award, view and accept the award offer in the WizeHive portal



REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

- All projects are required to submit an Initial Project
 Progress Report (3 months after project start date) and Final
 Project Report (after completion of the project)
- Projects greater than \$50,000 will be required to submit
 Quarterly Progress Reports and attend quarterly check-ins




