Mission: To work in partnership with communities to protect and promote the health and well-being of all Boston residents, especially those impacted by racism and systemic inequities.





Existing Capital Projects

- Northampton Square Garage Renovations. Phase One to repair the roof deck remains in the design phase, with completion of the design by the Fall.

- Once the roof deck work is complete, the City will move to Phase Two to repair the interior of all three floors of the garage.

Federal Funding




- **FY26 federal funding projection**: \$50.7M, or 19% of BPHC budget.
- Majority of funding through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.
- Preparedness activities:





Community Healing Response Network (CHRN)




A network of neighborhood-level community healing response teams, led and coordinated by BPHC, providing community outreach and engagement; short-term crisis intervention and case management; long term behavioral health services,

- Successful restructure (10 on-call responders under two Response Managers)
- New Charlestown partnership



Behavioral Health & Wellness

- Building a behavioral health workforce that fits Boston's needs: 238 clinicians trained
- Trauma informed school transformation pilot: 10 schools
- City Learning Collaborative:
 5 City departments
 participating
- Youth-focused anti-stigma campaign





Access to Health Services

- Co-leading Dorchester Working Group & issued recommendations regarding Carney Hospital closure
- Co-leading 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) with the Boston Community Health Collaborative
- Leading the Mayor's Health Line:
 1,242 enrolled in health insurance,
 4,963 connected to health and social services in FY24
- Highlighting women's health needs: inaugural Black women's health conference



Infectious Disease

- Measles prevention and response preparedness
- HIV Prevention, Care and Treatment
 - HIV Cluster Response
 - Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Funding
 - Ending the HIV Epidemic Funding
- Responding to respiratory viral infections, including COVID-19 and avian influenza (H5N1)

Recovery Services Bureau

- Harm Reduction (AHOPE, Street Outreach)
- Access to Care (PAATHS)
- Day spaces
- Community Prevention (Youth & Overdose)
- Residential Treatment (Entre Familia, Transitions)
- Strategic Partnerships (Low threshold shelter, Opioid Settlement funding, Overdose Data to Action)
- Syringe Clean-up (Mobile Sharps Team; Back2Work)

11 programs/divisions total, 3 campuses, ~151 staff total

Mobile Operations: Extending Reach

Mobile Outreach Team

- Citywide 311 response; working with CRT
- New: Embedding PAATHS personnel
- Co-response to help get individuals into treatment and shelter
- Syringe pick-up

Syringe Collection:

- Mobile Sharps Team: new van, expanded hours
- Expanded Newmarket BID Back2Work
- AHOPE
- Syringe kiosks/drop-off: new map
- Pilot peer collection program with LTS





New Partnerships for Improving Community Outcomes

Strategic Partnerships

- Deployed 4 Public Health Vending Machines
- Launched Family Overdose Support Fund
- OD2A deployed 8 naloxone kiosks
- New access to outpatient treatment

18,483 naloxone doses distributed





New Partnerships for Improving Community Outcomes

- Residential Treatment
 - **Transitions:** Community Caring Clinic bringing in more mental health support. 612 admissions through 4/1.
 - Entre Familia: Doula Pilot. 59 admissions through 4/1.
- **BHCHP Clinic:** prescribing MOUD, infectious disease care, centralizing medical and recovery services
- Community Grants: \$1 million among 5 community organizations to prevent overdose deaths and provide substance use treatment



Homeless Services: Census + Housing Placements

- Shelter census remains high at 112 Southampton and Woods Mullen:
 - 3,341 guests in FY25 through 4/1
 - 66% increase in guests from FY22 to FY24
- Focus on moving guests out of shelter:
 - 90 Day Challenge
 - 226 placements to permanent housing in FY25 through 4/1



Shelter Programs + Services

- Serving Ourselves Program (SOS): 117 participants. This workforce development program supports guests in learning skills, saving money, and securing permanent employment.
- Overnight Harm Reduction Technicians: partnership with Boston Health Care for the Homeless ensures safety. Techs respond to overdose and offer wound care and other medical support and refer people to services.
