TO THE CITY COUNCIL

Dear Councilors:

I transmit herewith for your approval an appropriation order in the total amount of **THIRTY-TWO MILLION, SIX HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS AND NO CENTS (\$32,600,000)** from Fiscal Year 2026 community preservation fund revenues for community preservation projects at the recommendation of the City of Boston Community Preservation Committee (“CPC”).

The Fund was created upon the adoption of the Community Preservation Act, Massachusetts General Laws chapter 44B, (the “Act”) in November 2016 and is funded by the 1% property tax-based surcharge on residential and business property tax bills that took effect in July 2017 and an annual state distribution from the Massachusetts Community Preservation Trust Fund. Section 5 of the Act provides that in each fiscal year, upon receiving recommendations from the Community Preservation Committee, the City Council shall take action and approve such appropriations from the Community Preservation Fund in order to implement the recommendations of the Community Preservation Committee.

The CPC is recommending \$16,300,000 in affordable housing projects, \$8,150,000 in historic preservation projects, and \$8,150,000 in open space and recreational use projects. Since adopting the Community Preservation Act, over \$230 million has been awarded to 397 projects spanning across every neighborhood in the City of Boston. With your approval of this appropriation request, we will have awarded over \$260 million to 442 projects since the first funding round in 2018. Since 2018, only eighteen awarded projects have been withdrawn, resulting in more than \$5 million being returned to the reserve for future projects.

The upcoming projects will aim to improve the quality of life across Boston neighborhoods. Plans include renovating playgrounds and enhancing or creating recreational spaces such as parks, community gardens, and urban farms. In addition, these projects will plant trees to grow the city’s tree canopy, preserve historic buildings and artifacts, support a program for affordable first-time homebuyers and construct new affordable housing units for residents. Together, these efforts are expected to deliver a meaningful and lasting positive impact on Boston’s neighborhoods and communities.

I urge your Honorable Body to pass this order expeditiously so that the CPC may fund important



affordable housing, historic preservation, open space and recreational use projects in the City of Boston prior to the close of the Fiscal Year 2026.
