IF ALL RECALL, LAST YEAR, THE
CITY COUNCIL PASSED SIMILAR
LEGISLATION TO BE CONSISTENT
WITH THE STATE AND NATIONAL
REGULATIONS AND DEFINITIONS BY
REPLACING PROVISIONS OF THE
WELDING AND CUTTING ARTICLE WITH
THE MORE INCLUSIVE REGULATION OF
HOT WORK.
THIS ORDINANCE LOOKS TO AMEND
THE BOSTON FIRE PREVENTION CODE
TO DELARFY SEVERAL PROVISIONS
UPDATING THE TERMINOLOGY AND
ENSURING CONSISTENCY WITH
CURRENT PRACTICES.
AND JOINING US TODAY IS CONNIE
WONG WHO IS THE DEPUTY
COMMISSIONER LABOR RELATIONS
HUMAN RESOURCES AND LEGAL ANARES
OF THE BOSTON FIRE DEPARTMENT
AND ALSO WE ARE JOINED BY OUR
DEPUTY FIRE CHIEF JACK DEMPSEY,
FIRE MARSHAL FROM THE BOSTON
FIRE DEPARTMENT.
SO WITH THAT, I'M GOING TO ALLOW
YOU TO OPEN AND THEN WE'LL HAVE
A LITTLE Q&A AND TRY TO GET THIS
MOVING AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE.
>> THANK YOU, COUNCILOR.
THANK YOU FOR HOSTING THIS
HEARING.
AS YOU INDICATED, LAST SUMMER,
WE PASSED THE ORDINANCE TO AMEND
ARTICLE 8 TO INCLUDE HOT WORKS
AND A KEY PART OF THAT ORDINANCE
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WAS THE HOT WORKS CERTIFICATION

PROGRAM THAT THE BOSTON FIRE
DEPARTMENT IN CONJUNCTION WITH
THE ASSOCIATION SMEAR HEADED AND
BASED ON THAT WE'VE GOT A LOT OF
THE POSITIVE FEEDBACK FROM THE
CONTRACTORS AND WORKING WITH
THAT ORDINANCE IN THE LAST NEAR
LAY YEAR NOW, IT'S COME TO OUR
ATTENTION THAT WE NEED TO
STREAMLINE AND CLARIFY A NUMBER
OF THE OTHER PROVISIONS IN THE
ARTICLE TO MAKE IT SIMPLIFIED
AND EASIER TO READ FOR THE
CONTRACTORS.

SO WITH THAT, I WILL TURN IT
OVER TO CHIEF JACK DEMPSEY.
HE CAN GIVE MORE UPDATES ON WHAT
WE'RE WORKING ON AS WELL AS WHAT
WE ARE ASKING TO CLARIFY TODAY.
>> THANK YOU, CONNIE.
AND WELCOME, CHIEF.
THANK YOU.

>> GOOD AFTERNOON, COUNCILOR. THANK YOU FOR HAVING US HERE TODAY.

AS CONNIE MENTIONED, WE PASSED THE ORDINANCE LAST YEAR AND THERE'S BEEN A LOT OF PROGRESS SINCE THEN, AND I'LL JUST GO OVER SOME OF THE NUMBERS THAT WE

WE'RE TRAINING 16,000 THEE 16 MEMBERS SINCE MID-OCTOBER. THAT'S WHEN WE STARTED THE TRAINING.

OUT OF THAT, 13,979 ARE UNION WORKERS AND 2,337 ARE NONUNION. I'VE BEEN WORKING CLOSELY TO MAKE SURE THAT THE COURSES KEPT RELEVANT TO ALL THE TRADES. AND ONE OF THE OTHER THINGS WE HAD TO DO WAS WE FOUND OUT AS WE WERE GOING ALONG, WE HAD TO MAKE THIS MULTILINGUAL.

SO ONE THING THAT WE KIND OF GOT CAUGHT OFF-GUARD WITH.

BUT SO SINCE -- WHEN WE FOUND THAT OUT, THE NFPA TRANSLATED THIS INTO SPANISH, VIETNAMESE, EUROPEAN PORTUGUESE, BRAZILIAN PORTUGUESE AND WE'RE LOOKING AT RUSSIAN AND UKRAINIAN NOW. ANY OTHER LANGUAGE WE'LL CROSS THAT WHEN IT HAPPENS.

THE OTHER SURPRISING -- NOT SURPRISING TO US WHERE THIS IS AN -- A -- NOT JUST A LOCAL PROBLEM, IT HAPPENS EVERYWHERE. WE GET MULTIPLE CITIES AROUND THE COUNTRY SHOWING INTEREST, AND EVEN FROM OUTSIDE THE COUNTRY THAT WE FOUND THAT THE MFPA CONFERENCE LAST WEEK OR TWO WEEKS AGO.

CITIES LIKE NASHVILLE, SEATTLE, NEW YORK CITY AND SAN FRANCISCO JUST TO NAME A COUPLE CAN.
SO IT'S GETTING ATTENTION.
ALSO HAD SOME GOOD CONVERSATION WITH THE INSURANCE INDUSTRY.
THEY'RE VERY INTERESTED IN IT.
THEY CERTAINLY SEE THE VALUE OF STOPPING FIRES.

HOT WORKS IS A PRETTY -- PRETTY COMMON FIRE ON THE CONSTRUCTION SIDE.

SO -- AND WE WILL BE BRINGING THIS COURSE TO THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL VERY SOON AND HOPING TO EXPAND IT OUT TO THE REST OF THE STATE.

AT LOT OF PEOPLE THAT COME HERE TO WORK ARE NOT FROM THE CITY OF BOSTON, THOUGH WE'RE GETTING COMPANIES FROM RHODE ISLAND AND WHATEVER, AND THERE ARE -- SO WE ALL NEED THE TRAINING.

WE THINK IT'S GOING PRETTY GOOD. FROM THE CITY'S POINT, SO IN FISCAL YEAR 2017, WE'VE ISSUED 2,989 HOT WORK PERMITS AND WE EXPECT THAT TO CONTINUE TO RISE. 2016, WE DID 2,645 SO -->> ANY VIOLATIONS, CHIEF? YEAH, WE ALWAYS RUN INTO

VIOLATIONS.

IF I CAN GET 8,000 OF THESE

16,000 PEOPLE TO PRACTICE WHAT

THEY PREACH, WE'VE MADE DRASTIC

IMPROVEMENT.
>> THE VIOLATIONS HAVE BEEN
IGNORANCE THAT THERE'S --

>> YEAH --ORDINANCE OR IS IT BUSINESS PRACTICES AND --

>> WELL, THERE IS A TREND THAT WE HAD TO IMPLEMENT THIS.

WE HAD TO GIVE PEOPLE TIME TO

GET TRAINED.

WE'VE BEEN TRAINING NONSTOP, AND WE'RE UP TO 16,000.

SO THE LOGISTICS OF DOING THAT.

SO WE'RE STILL COMING ACROSS

PEOPLE WHO DON'T HAVE THE COURSE WHERE -- YOU KNOW, WE'RE PUSHING

WE TICKET THEM.

WE STOP THE JOB OR MAKE THEM GIVE SOMEBODY THAT'S HAD THE COURSE TO BE THERE.

81% OF THE PERMITS APPLIED FOR WE ISSUE WITHIN ONE DAY AND 89% ARE ISSUED WITHIN THREE DAYS OF APPLYING.

SO WE THINK THAT'S -- THAT'S PRETTY GOOD.

IT MOVES THE JOBS ALONG.
PEOPLE AREN'T WAITING, TIED UP
IN RED TAPE.

OVER THE COURSE OF THIS PAST YEAR, WE'VE COLLECTED \$363,000 IN FEES JUST FOR THE PERMITTING PART.

THAT'S NOT COUNTING THE TICKETING PART.

SO THOSE ARE THE NUMBERS RIGHT NOW.

AND SO I WAS GOING TO MOVE ON FROM HERE INTO ARTICLE 8 AND AS LAST YEAR WHEN WE TRIED TO WRITE IN WHAT, WAS DONE, WE FOUND A LOT OF -- NOT CONFLICTS BUT IT JUST DIDN'T READ WELL, AND A LOT OF ITEMS THAT WE MISSED. AND I -- NONE OF THEM ARE GAME-CHANGERS, BUT I THOUGHT IT WAS NECESSARY THAT WE COME BACK AND CHANGE THE WORDING IN THE ARTICLE SO THAT WHAT WE WANT TO DO IS MAKE SURE WHEN PEOPLE PICK THIS UP AND READ IT THAT IT'S VERY CLEAR AND CONCISE AND THERE'S NO CONFUSION. SO WE'RE TRYING TO MAKE IT CUSTOMER FRIENDLY.

COSTOMER FRIENDEI.

FOR THE CONSTITUENTS.

>> SO COUNCILOR, AS THE

ORDINANCE PROPOSAL READS FOR EACH SECTION THAT WE WISH TO AMEND, IT'S LAID OUT FAIRLY CLEARLY AND CONCISELY.
DO YOU WISH TO GO THROUGH EACH OF THEM?

>> WE MIGHT AS WELL FOR THE INTEREST OF THE PUBLIC, FOR THOSE WHO ARE VIEWING AT HOME AND THOSE IN ATTENDANCE.

IF WE RUN THROUGH THEM QUICKLY THAT WOULD BE GREAT.

SO SECTION 1, 8.03A, WE DELETED WELDING AND CUTTING AND CHANGED IT TO HOT WORK.

AND THE ORIGINAL ORDER, IT DIDN'T TAKE INTO ACCOUNT WHETHER IT WAS CUTTING AND WELDING OR WELDING AND CUTTING. SO JUST A SIMPLE SWITCH. BUT THAT'S WHAT THAT CHANGE WAS. AND THAT WAS MADE IN A COUPLE OF PLACES.

SO THAT TAKES CARE OF SECTION 1.

SECTION 2, WE DELETED COURSE COMPLETION AND WE BASICALLY FELT THAT THE TERM COURSE COMPLETION DOESN'T INDICATE THAT THERE'S A LEVEL OF CERTIFICATION THAT'S BEEN ACHIEVED.

SO IF SOMEBODY TAKES THE COURSE AND THEY FLUNK THE TEST, THEY HAVEN'T --

>> ARE THERE MULTIPLE LEVELS OF CERTIFICATION?

>> NO, IT'S JUST THE ONE CERTIFICATION BUT THERE IS A TEST REQUIRED TO PASS. >> OKAY.

SECTION 3, 803B, DELETED UNDER INDIVIDUAL JOB AUTHORIZATION ISSUED BY THE HOT WORK OPERATION CONTRACTOR. WE REMOVED THAT BECAUSE IT'S AN AUTOMATIC CONDITION OF THE PERMIT.

>> OKAY.

A LOT OF THIS IS TRYING TO JUST MAKE IT BRIEFER AND CLEARER.

SECTION 4, 803B, THREED HOT WORK FIRE-WATCHER AND IN ITS PLACE, NFPA HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATION.

THAT WAS CHANGED TO REFLECT THE PROPER TERMINOLOGY, WHICH IS THE ADDITION OF A HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATION.

>> AND HOW MANY NFPA HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATE -- LIKE HOW MANY HOT FIRE WATCHERS, WE HAVE THEM BY THE DOZENS?

IS THAT A BUSINESS IN IT SELF-OR

IS THAT US, DEPUTY OR --

>> HOW MANY PEOPLE HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED?

>> YEAH.

16,300 --

ALL --

SO THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN -- A LOT OF THE PEOPLE DO GET THAT TERM MIX UP.

ING THAT IT'S A PAID FIRE DETAIL.

>> RIGHT.

BUT I'M ASSUMING ANYONE THAT'S DOING WELDING, DO WE HAVE A NEAR DETAIL ON THESE JOBS OR NOT? >> ACCORDING TO THE STANDARD, YOU'RE REQUIRED TO HAVE A FIRE

WATCH, BUT IT'S NOT ALWAYS A PAID FIRE DETAIL, AND I'LL GIVE YOU AN EXAMPLE WHY.

ON A BRAND-NEW BUILDING THAT'S

COME UP FROM THE GROUND UP, THEY -- WE GET IS SIX-MONTH

PERMIT, HOT WORK PERMIT.

AT THE BEGINNING OF THE PROJECT,

FIREFIGHTER COMING OVER ON A

>> NO.

IT TRIGGERS OUR REVIEW.

WE REVIEW EVERY HOT WORK

PROJECT.

SO THIS BUILDING STARTED FROM THE BEGINNING.

WE WOULD GO OUT AND LOOK AND SAY, OH, IT'S A BUILDING FROM SCRATCH.

IT DOESN'T REQUIRE A DETAIL RIGHT NOW.

>> DO WE HAVE THE ABILITY IF -IF WE -- IF IT DID REQUIRE A
DETAIL, DO WE HAVE THE ABILITY
TO STAFF APPROPRIATELY OR

WOULD -- >> YES.

, WE WOULD ALWAYS -- WHAT THIS DOES AND IT DOESN'T CHANGE THE PAST PRACTICE, WITH A FIRE WATCH, THERE'S ALWAYS BEEN THE ABILITY NOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT TO REVIEW EVERY SINGLE PERMIT APPLICATION AND DETERMINE WAS IT NECESSARY FOR A FIREFIGHTER TO BE THERE, TO BE THAT WATCH. >> WHAT'S COMING TO MY, VERY SIMILAR, WE PASSIONED --SH PAD -- PASSED FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT TO ALLOW RETIREES TO PERFORM SORT OF PAID DETAILS UP IN A CERTAIN AGE. WE HAVE EXPERIENCED, TRAINED

WE HAVE EXPERIENCED, TRAINED INDIVIDUALS WHO FOR NO FAULT OF THEIR OWN TURNS AGE 65 AND THEY HAVE TO RETIRE BUT THEY'RE STILL

VERY CAPABLE.

THIS MAY BE SOMETHING THAT WE MAY WANT TO TALK ABOUT HAVING AN OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE RETIRED FIREFIGHTERS BACK AND PERFORM PAID DETAIL TO HELP SUPPLEMENT THEIR RETIREMENT INCOME.

>> I THINK THAT'S A DISCUSSION FOR DOWN THE LINE IN YES, I AGREE.

I THINK THAT'S SOMETHING
DEFINITELY WE SHOULD LOOK AT.
>> THERE'S A LOT OF DETAILS IN
THE CITY PARTICULARLY AROUND THE
CONSTRUCTION SITES.
THEY'RE GOING UNMANNED.

THERE'S NO COST TO THE CITY.
WE ACTUALLY GET SERVICE FEE AND
THE COMPANIES ARE PAYING FOR THE
DETAIL.

SO IT'S A -- IF ANYTHING, WE GENERATE FROM THE PERMITTING PORTION OF IT AS OPPOSED TO JUST LETTING IT GO AND SORT OF REGAINING THE CITY OF BOSTON HUNDREDS OF DETAILS ARE GOING UNNILED.

AND SO -- UNFILLED.

SO THAT WAS THE INFERENCE BEHIND LOOKING AT TAKING RETIRED POLICE OFFICER HAVING THEM.

THIS IS VERY SIMILAR TO THAT.
OF COURSE, THERE'S A LOT OF FIRE
DETAILS THAT ALSO GO UNMANNED
BECAUSE OF THE DEMAND AND BUSY
CITY AND LOTS OF STUFF
HAPPENING.

AND THEN TO ADD ON TOP OF THIS, MAY BE AN OPPORTUNITY TO REVISIT THAT.

>> EXACTLY.

THERE ARE DAYS WHERE WE'RE TIGHT ON FINDING PEOPLE TO DO THEM. THERE'S ON AN AVERAGE 65 DETAILS A DAY FOR HOT WORK ALONE.

>> 65?

SO THERE'S ABOUT 65 HOT WORKS PROJECTS GOING ON --

>> YEAH, THERE'S PROBABLY --THERE'S MORE PERMITS OUT THERE THAN THAT.

BUT NOT ALWAYS -- THEY MAY NOT BE DOING HOT WORK THAT SPECIFIC DAY.

THE PERMIT COULD GO FOR SIX MONTHS.

LIKE I WAS STARTING TO SAY, ONCE THE BUILDING STARTS GETTING ENCLOSED AND THE HAZARD BECOMES LARGER, THEN WE TAKE A CLOSER LOOK, AND WE ALWAYS REVISIT THE PROJECTS AND DETERMINE -- >> BECAUSE EVERY SINGLE CONSTRUCTION SITE, IT'S ALWAYS FLUID.

SO THINGS ALWAYS HAPPENING AT A DIFFERENT PACE.

SO THE FIRE DEPARTMENT WORKS VERY CLOSELY WITH THE CONTRACTORS OUT THERE.

AND OUR FIRE INSPECTORS ARE OUT THERE EVERY DAY IN RIGHT.

>> VISITING VARIOUS SITES AND ONCE YOU KEEP THAT LINE OF COMMUNICATION OPEN, THEN YOU COULD PROBABLY DO A BETTER JOB AT WORKING WHEN DO WE REALLY NEED A FIREFIGHTER AS de TAIL.

WE KEEP THAT COMMUNICATION OPEN AND TAKE IT DAY BY DAY.

>> THE INFERENCE WIND HYPED THIS WAS THE BEACON STREET FIRE. >> YEAH.

THAT WAS OBVIOUSLY A BUILDING THAT WAS FULLY CONSTRUCTED. THEY WERE DOING SOME REHAB WORK AND WELDING --

>> RIGHT.
WHAT WERE THEY DOING?
YEAH, THEY WERE -- SO WHAT
HAPPENED THERE, TWO MAJOR
FACTORS IN THAT THAT BROUGHT
ABOUT THAT FIRE WAS, NUMBER ONE,
THIS WAS A CONTRACTOR -- SMALL
COMPANY DOING HOT WORK ON THE
REAR OF THE BUILDING WITHOUT A
PERMIT OR A DETAIL, WHICH BOTH
WOULD HAVE BEEN REQUIRED WITH
THE WORK THEY WERE DOING.
THE SECOND THING WAS THE
ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS, THE
WIND THAT DAY WAS BLOWING 60

MILE-MILE-AN-HOUR WINDS GLOWING BLOWING OFF THE CHARLES RIVER RIGHT TOWARDS THE BUILDING.
BOTH THOSE CONDITIONS WOULD HAVE BEEN ENOUGH FOR US TO SAY, YOU'RE NOT DOING HOT WORK TODAY.
>> THESE REGULATIONS ON A WINDY DAY, IS THAT SOMETHING THAT'S TAKEN --

>> ADDRESS BOTH OF THOSE.
OBVIOUSLY LIEUTENANT WALSH
AND KELLY LOST THEIR LIVES IN
THAT FIRE.

>> YES.

OUR PRAYERS CONTINUE ROMAINE WITH THEM AND THEIR FAMILIES. >> THEY WERE THE CATALYST HAD THIS, UNFORTUNATELY. THE TWO STATISTICS WE DIDN'T NEED.

>> RIGHT.

SO FIRE WATCHER WAS THE TERM USED YEARS AGO IN THE ORIGINAL AND THAT'S SINCE BEEN CHANGED TO FIRE WATCH.

>> WHEN I READ THE WORDS HOT WORK FIRE WATCHER, I IMMEDIATELY THINK OF A FIREFIGHTERS ON A DETAIL OBSERVING MAKING SURE THAT --

>> YES.

IN THIS INSTANCE, IT COULD JUST BE THE CIVILIAN RANK-AND-FILE PERSON THAT WORKS FOR A COMPANY THAT DOES WELDING BUT THEY HAVE THE CERTIFICATION. >> SOME OF THESE HOT WORK PROJECTS DON'T REQUIRE BOSTON FIRE PAID DETAIL ON IT. IT MAY BE A SMALL -- LET'S SAY A PLUMBING -- A PLUMBER. WE DON'T PERMIT PLUMBING JOBS. THEY'RE DOING HOT WORK, THOUGH, ACCORDING TO THE NEW REGULATION, I CAN'T GIVE PERMITS THAT'S GOING TO FIVE DIFFERENT PROPERTIES TODAY AND HAVE SOMEBODY FOLLOW THEM AROUND. BUT THEY ARE STILL REQUIRED --THEY'RE DOING HOT WORK SO THEY'RE REQUIRED TO HAVE A FIRE WATCH.

>> OKAY.

AND THIS TRAINING IS TO MAKE

THEM AWARE OF IT.

THEY'RE REQUIRED TO HAVE THIS TRAINING ALSO.

>> OKAY.

ALL RIGHT.

>> DOES THAT MAKE SENSE?

YES, IT DOES.

OKAY.

SO MOVING ON, SECTION 5, 803-POINT -- 8.03B, ONCE AGAIN, COURSE COMPLETION, WE REMOVED THAT FOR THE SAME REASON.

SORRY.

SECTION 6, 8.03B, WE DELETED "AND REQUIRED" BECAUSE IT -- ELIMINATION OF REDUNDANT TERMS.

>> IMPORTANT.

8.03E, WE DELETED "PAID FIRE DETAIL" AND REPLACED IT WITH THE TERM "FIRE WATCH CZECH.
AND WE DID THAT FOR KISS CAN TENTY -- CONSISTENCY IN

TERRIBLENOLOGY.

IF YOU -- TERMINOLOGY.

IF YOU LOOK AT IN THE ARTICLE THAT THAT WAS GOING TO COME OUT AND GO TO 803B, AND I'LL JUST READ THAT BECAUSE WE HAD A FEW CHANGES HERE.

THE WAY IT'S GOING TO READ, IT'S GOING TO COME OUT PRETTY SIMPLE AND CLEAR.

NO PERSON SHALL SERVE AS A FIRE WATCH UNLESS HE HOLDS AN NFPA HOT WORK SAFETY CERTIFICATION OR EQUIVALENT CERTIFICATION AS DETERMINED BY THE HEAD OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT OR IS AN AUTHORIZED MEMBER OF THE BOSTON FIRE DEPARTMENT EMPLOYED AS A FIRE WATCH.

SO THAT WOULD HAVE BEEN AT ONE POINT WAS -- WAS PAID DETAIL IN OKAY.

>> AND --

LL RIGHT.

THAT SEEMED PRETTY CLEAR.

YEAH.

IT DOES.

>> OKAY.

GO ON TO SECTION 8, 8.03C, AND WE DELETED "HE MAY PRESCRIBE" AND REPLACED IT WITH "MAY BE PRESCRIBED."

IT'S JUST A GENDER-NEUTRAL -- >> OKAY.

8.03C, THIS IS SECTION 9, WE DELETED TWO CLASSES OF.

AND THE REASON IS TWO CLASSES HAVE NOW BEEN REDUCED TO ONE CERTIFICATION.

AT ONE POINT, THERE WAS A CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY FOR WELDERS AND THERE WAS ALSO A CERTIFICATE FOR FIRE WATCHES. SO WE REDUCED THAT TO ONE. >> YES.

SECTION 10, 8.03C, WE DELETED "AS DETERMINED BY THE HEAD OF THE FIRE TEPT" AND THAT WAS A BREFILITY OF LANGUAGE -- BREVITY OF LANGUAGE.

SECTION 11, 8.03D, INSERT AFTER ALL, NFPA HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATION AND DELETED NFPA HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATION. IT SOUNDS CONFUSING BUT IT'S ACTUALLY CLARITY WHEN YOU READ THE COMPLETED -- WHAT IT'S GOING TO LOOK LIKE IN THE END. SECTION 12, THIS WAS KIND OF A

BIGGER SECTION THAT WE WORKED ON AND WE DELETED THE -- WE CHANGED THE TITLE AND THE WHOLE SECTION, AND IT'S BASICALLY WHAT IT -- THE OLD ONE WAS TALKING MORE ABOUT THE FIRE DETAIL IN THERE AND THE FIRE WATCH.

IT WAS CONFUSING ON WHO WAS RESPONSIBLE FOR WHAT.

AND JOB AUTHORIZATION IS WHAT WE TITLED IT NOW, WE MADE IT CLEAR SO 8.04A WILL NOW -- IT GIVES THE PROPERTY OWNERS AUTHORIZATION.

SO THE PROPERTY OWNER'S GOING TO HAVE HOT WORK DONE, THEY KNOW EXACTLY WHAT THEY NEED TO DO. THEY KNOW THE LETTER THEY NEED PROVIDE AND WHAT WE'RE LOOKING FOR.

SECTION B OF THAT IS THE DEFINITION FOR THE CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES, WHICH IS A LITTLE MORE IN-DEPTH THAT WE NEED.

WE'RE LOOKING FOR THE OWNER OF THE BUILD SOMETHING I'M GIVING THIS -- BUILDING IS I'M LOOKING FOR PERMISSION TO DO WORK IN MY BUILDING BASICALLY.

>> WAS THAT THE DESCRIBE -- DOES IT HAVE THE STATE HOT WORKS IN MY BUILDING OR JUST WORK?

>> YES, IT'S AUTHORIZING THEM TO DO HOT WORK.

>> OKAY.

AND THE DEFINITIONS FROM
THE -- ON THE PERMIT WE ASK FOR
MORE DETAILED INFORMATION THAT
WOULD COME FROM THE CONTRACTOR.
>> WAS THERE SOMETHING BETWEEN
THE CONTRACTOR AND THE HOMEOWNER
OR VICE VERSA OR --

>> IT JUST -- JUST TRYING TO MAKE IT A LITTLE EASIER ON EVERYBODY AND --

>> I WOULD ASSUME YOU HAD REACHED OUT TO THE INSURANCE INDUSTRY.

THE INSURANCE INDUSTRY THIS BRINGS SOME CLARITY PROBABLY FROM THEIR PERSPECTIVE TOO WHETHER OR NOT THEY'RE GOING TO COVER A CLAIM.

>> SO WHAT'S DIFFICULT WITH THE PROPERTY OWNER WAS, IF -- I'M TRYING TO GIVE DETAILS THAT THEY DON'T KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT THAT THE CONTRACTOR WAS DOING.
THEY KNOW THEY'RE WELDING BUT THEN THEY DON'T KNOW THAT WE HAVE TO PUT UP RAILINGS FOR THIS OR -- OR -- A LOT OF THE THINGS THAT THEY DON'T KNOW OR EVEN THE TYPE OF WELDING THAT THEY'RE DOING.

>> IT JUST GETS CONFUSING FOR THE PROPERTY OWNER AND I THINK IT'S EASIER FOR THEM TO SAY WE HIRED THEM TO DO THE JOB AND WE'RE AUTHORIZES THEM TO DO THE JOB.

NOW, WHEN THE CONTRACTOR FILLS OW THE PERMIT, THEY'RE GOING TO TELL US WHAT EXACTLY THEY'RE DOING AND THEN WE GO OUT AND WE CHECK TO MAKE SURE.

>> GOT YOU.

IT WOULD BE MORE SUFFICIENT FOR THE CITY TO DO THE JOB TOO BECAUSE NOW EVERYONE'S ON

NOTICE, THE OWNER, THE CONTRACTOR AND THE CITY. THERE'S THAT THREE-WAY COMMUNICATION AS OPPOSED TO JUST THE DEPARTMENT AND A CONTRACTOR. THE OWNER MIGHT NOT KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT IT. >> ONE OF THE OTHER THINGS IS SO THE WAY I LOOK AT IT -->> CHIEF, DOES THIS COVER SUBCONTRACTORS TOO? >> YES. OKAY. IT'S WHOEVER PULLS --SUBCONTRACTOR -- DEPENDS ON WHO'S PULLING THE CONTRACT -- I MEAN, THE SUBCONTRACTOR IS WORKING FOR THE CONTRACTOR SO

THEY'RE COVERED.

THE OTHER THING WE DIDN'T WANT
TO DO, THE PROPERTY OWNER SAYS
THEY'RE WORKING ON THE ROOF AND
THEN THEY FIND OUT THEY GOT TO
DO WORK ON THE FIRST FLOOR TOO.
NOW THEY'RE GOING TO -- THERE'S
A CONFLICT THERE, WHICH WE'LL
WANT THEM TO HAVE TO COME IN AND
REDO THE LETTER AND GO THROUGH
THE WHOLE PROCESS AGAIN.
SO TRYING TO MAKE IT BETTER FOR
EVERYBODY AND COVER EVERYBODY.
>> OKAY.

SECTION 13, OKAY, WE DELETED "WHERE FIRE WATCH IS REQUIRED." WE CHANGED THE TITLE FOR CLARITY.

AND BASICALLY CHANGE IT TO "CONDITIONS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRE WATCH."

SECTION 14, IT'S 805 -- 8.05 AND FIRST PARAGRAPH WE DELETED IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REWROTE IT TO MAKE IT CLEARER.

IF YOU WANT I'LL READ IT.

>> APPRECIATE IT.

SECTION 15, 8.05B, WE JUST --WE ADDED FOLLOWING SWAG AND IT'S JUST AN EXPANSION OF THE DEFINITION.

>> WHAT IS SLAG? SLAG IS IF YOU'RE BUILD WELDING AND THE PIECES ARE HOT. THE LITTLE PIECES OF HOT METAL THAT FALL OFF. SECTION 16, 8.05D.

WOE ADD THE CONVECTION -- WE
ADDED CONVECTION TO DESCRIBE.

THE ORIGINAL ONE ONLY HAD TWO
FORMS OF HEAT TRANSFER, AND TO
BE CORRECT, THERE'S THREE.

SO WE ADDED CONVECTION TO THAT. >> OKAY.
SECTION 17, 8.05, THE LAST

PARAGRAPH, WE DELETED THAT IN ITS ENTIRETY AND WE WROTE IT --REWROTE IT FOR CLARITY PURPOSES JUST TO MAKE SURE IT'S CLEAR. SECTION 18, 19 AND 20 ALL FALL UNDER THIS NEXT SECTION, 8.06, AND IT'S ALL, ONCE AGAIN, CHANGING CUTTING AND WELD, ING AND REPLACING TO HOT WORK. THOSE WEREN'T COVERED IN SECTION 2 OF THE ORDINANCE THAT WAS PASSED.

>> THOSE ARE NEW ADDITIONS?
YEAH, WHICH, LIKE I SAID, IT
WOULD SAY WELDING AND CUTTING
AND NOW IT'S -- THE PARTS IT'S
SAYING CUTTING -- I'M GETTING
CONFUSED GOING BACK IS AND
FORTH.

OKAY.

SO SECTION 21, 8.06B, ONCE AGAIN, WE DELETED FOR CLARITY PARK WELDING AND CUTTING. WE FEEL THAT WAS NECESSARY TO WORD IT THAT WAY.

SECTION 22 IS 8.06E.

DELETED IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACED WITH THE LAST SENTENCE THERE, HOT TAPPING AND OTHER HOT WORK.

AND WE MADE ONCE AGAIN FOR CLARITY.

SECTION 23, 8.07A, B, C, D, AND E, ONCE AGAIN, CUTTING AND WELDING, WE HAD TO REPLACE IT WITH HOT WORK.

SECTION 24, 8.07A, WE DELETED "AFTER OWNER, TENANT OR GENERAL CONTRACTOR" AND THE HOT WORK CONTRACTOR.

WE DID THAT FOR CLARITY PURPOSES.

SECTION 25, 26, AND 27, WE MADE CHANGES WITH THE WORDING AND WHATEVER OUGHT TO REINFORCE

SECTION 8.04A.

SECTION 28, 8.07C, WE DELETED WITH AIR FOR CLARITY.

I DON'T KNOW TOO MUCH DUST WHERE THERE ISN'T AIR INVOLVED SO -->> UH-HMM.

SECTION 29, 8.08A, WE DELETED LICK WHICHFIED PETROLEUM GAS BECAUSE LPG IS NOT ALLOWED IN BUILDINGS CURRENTLY.

>> UH-HMM.

SECTION 30, 8.08E, THAT WAS A TYPO.

WE CHANGED HOT TO NOT. AND LASTLY WAS SECTION 31, WHICH WAS 8.09A, AND ONCE AGAIN, WE DELETED LIQUID PETROLEUM GAS WHICH IS LPG AND IT'S NOT ALLOWED IN BUILDINGS. >> OKAY.

AND --

PRETTY STRAIGHTFORWARD CHANGES, SOME MORE IN-DEPTH THAN OTHERS, BUT FOR THE MOST PART, IT'S CLARITY AND SOME ADDITIONS WHERE --

>> YEAH, WE JUST WANTED TO CLARIFY WHO'S RESPONSIBLE FOR WHAT AND -- AND ONCE AGAIN WE WANTED -- SO THAT IT WAS EASY TO READ FOR PEOPLE.

>> OKAY.

RIGHT NOW.

JUST EXPLAIN THE PROCESS FOR CERTIFICATION FOR THE NFPA HOT WORKS SAFETY CERTIFICATION. WHAT -- HOW LONG IS THAT COURSE? WHAT DOES IT ENTAIL? >> SO IT'S A COURSE RUN -- RUN AND MONITORED BY THE NFPA. IT'S A TWO-HOUR COURSE IN PERSON

AND THERE'S A TEST THAT FOLLOWS. IT'S A ONE-TIME -- ONE-TIME EVENT, UNLESS WE HAVE A -- AN INCIDENT WITH YOU, WE -- YOU KNOW, THAT'S UP TO US TO DECIDE WHETHER OR NOT TO -- WE HAVE THE ABILITY TO PULL THAT CERTIFICATION AT ANY TIME AND MAKE YOU REDO THE COURSE. SO WE'RE HOPING THAT PEOPLE PUT TO PRACTICE WHAT WE'RE TEACHING THEM, AND IF THEY DO, WE'LL HAVE A MUCH SAFER CONSTRUCTION RECORD WITHIN THE CITY.

>> VERY GOOD.

I SEE THAT THIS ARE REPRESENT AVES FROM LOCAL 718 JUST HERE TO OFFER SUPPORT OR TO BE HERE AND TO BE OBSERVING FOR PURPOSES OF THEIR MEMBERSHIP.

SO WE SEE FOLKS FROM 718 HERE. IS ANYONE WISHING TO OFFER PUBLIC TESTIMONY, THEY MAY DO SO NOW.

SEEING AND HEARING NO TAKERS, I APPRECIATE, CHIEF AND CONNIE. I'LL MAKE SURE I'LL GET THESE COPIES THROUGH STAFF TO MY COMPLETION.

BUT -- COMPLETION.

BUT IT'S ALL -- COLLEAGUES.
IT'S AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO ENHANCE WHAT WAS PUT IN PLACE LAST YEAR TO PREVENT HORRIFIC FIRES LIKE WE SAW ON BEACON STREET WHETHER IT'S A SMALL CONSTRUCTION PROJECT OR BIG CONSTRUCTION PROJECT.

I HOPE IT WILL KEEP AN EYE
TOWARDS HAVING FIREFIGHTER
DETAILS ON THERE, TRAINED AND
EXPERIENCED FIREFIGHTERS WHO CAN
RECOGNIZE THOSE TYPES OF
SITUATIONS BEFORE THEY GET OUT
OF HAND AND IT MAY BE AN
OPPORTUNITY FOR OUR RETIREES TO
SORT OF FIT THE BILL THERE
THAT'S AN OPPORTUNITY THROUGH
THE DEPARTMENT.

>> I WILL TAKE THIS MOMENT TO STATE THAT -- THANK THE COUNCIL FOR ALL THIS SUPPORT IN THIS. WE NEED YOUR BACKING AND THIS IS WHAT PUTS TEETH BEHIND US. WITHOUT THE ORDINANCE, THERE WOULD BE VERY DIFFICULT TO GET COMPLIANCE.

SO THAT MAKES A BIG DIFFERENCE.

>> WE'LL GET THIS THING BEFORE
THE COUNCIL FOR A VOTE AND TO
THE MAYOR FOR HIS SIGNATURE TO
PROTECT THE CITIZENS BUT ALSO TO
PROTECT THE MEN AND WOMEN THAT
RUN INTO THOSE SITUATIONS WHEN
THINGS BREAK DOWN AND IN THIS
SITUATION THEY BREAK DOWN PRETTY
