GOALS

Goal 1: Improve food access in underserved communities through economic development and community wealth building initiatives.

Priority issue: *Cost, physical access* identified as primary barriers to food. More food access outlets needed with range of food at affordable prices, including healthy food.

Suggestion to address this issue: Create "toolbox" of TA and other financial resources to *support development and/or expansion of food access retail* outlets in underserved communities, including:

- City of Boston Economic Development Resources
- External resources
- Potential newly created Food Access Economic Development Fund
- Procedures to promote toolbox, streamline access to resources in it, offer guidelines and support to sustain impact of resources.

Next steps: Identify and explore the following, to further inform this concept:

- **Available resources in City of Boston** Economic Development, potential to expand or tailor to support businesses that increase food access
- External resources that could be leveraged to support businesses that increase food access
- Models for a Food Access Economic Development Fund

Additional priority: Support development of OFAs brick-and-mortar SNAP match program, through advice and input on implementation and design.

Next steps: Waiting on notice about FINI grant, to arrive mid-March.



Goal 2: Improve food access in underserved communities by making more vacant land accessible and usable for cultivation by community members interested to pursue community gardening and commercial urban agriculture.

Priority issue: *Demand for land* to use for community gardening and urban agriculture, and *vacant land available*, but *barriers* for groups and individuals that seek to use this land include:

- Permitting/regulatory process to develop land for these purposes is complicated and arduous to navigate.
- **Costs to install water connections** and and other development activities are prohibitive.
- As with most new types of development, experienced design professionals and contractors re scarce.

Suggestion to address this issue: Support City and external partners in **bringing a determined number of plots into a usable state** for use as community gardens or urban agriculture plots.



Next steps:

- Convene City departments, external partners to identify roadblocks in zoning and permitting process and streamline navigation of these processes
- Identify parcels suitable for these uses, areas where more gardens or urban agricultural plots are in demand, and groups interested in gaining access to them
- Develop strategies for reducing costs, particularly for water connections, on a set of suitable plots, using economies of scale, and identify funding to support this work.
- Develop a process to connect interested parties with this land
- Increase capacity and resources for groups to hold and manage parcels.



Goal 3: Strengthen and expand resources that support Bostonians to access the food they need and want.

More review of large list of strategies and tactics needed, but initially identified areas in consideration:

- Create a strong, unified advocacy voice that:
 - Advocates for protection, expansion of state, federal programs relevant to our work (ex. SNAP, WIC, Summer Food Service Program)
 - Is inclusive of, participates in advocacy efforts from peers focused on other areas relevant to our constituency, including affordable housing, living wages, and so on.
- Exploring opportunities to increase physical food access through innovative transportation programs, for example:
 - Uber-sponsored rides home from grocery stores
 - Free grocery delivery services sponsored by the retailer
 - Shuttle services to food access outlets provided by social service providers



Working Groups Moving Forward



What do working groups need to be successful moving forward?

- Incorporating other voices
 - City departments
 - Other agencies with strong subject-matter expertise
 - Boston residents
- Setting goals for immediate initiatives, thinking about long-term trajectory for overall goal
- Additional research and network mapping support

 - Chairs/co-chairs
 - Other support roles?
