

#### **INCREASING ACCESS**

#### **Physical**

Can constituents get to food they need and want?

#### **Economic**

Can constituents afford the food they need and want?

#### Social

Is culturally appropriate food accessible?

#### **FOOD SECURITY**

All people, at all times, have physical, social, and economic access to sufficient and nutritious food that meets their dietary needs and food preferences for an active and healthy life.

#### What We Have Done

- Restructured office, revised mission and goals
  - Alignment with the City's focus on equity and resiliency.
- Successful 2017 CANshare fundraiser
- Participated in review of proposals for new BPS breakfast and lunch contract
- "Boston Bounty Bucks+"
  - Exploring pilot program with the Mayor's Office of New Urban Mechanics
  - Beyond farmer markets, into reliable food outlets that serve low-income communities
- Food Resource Information Map
  - Partnership with Boston Public Health Commission
- Healthy Incentive Program (HIP)
  - Economic commitment with the Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA)
  - Supporting implementation in Boston
- **♦** Boston Urban Farming Coalition
  - Creating in partnership with DND, urban agriculture advocates, farmers in Boston



#### What We Have Done

#### Advocacy

- Focus on state legislation that could advance food security in Boston
- ➤ Inclusion, in Mayor's FY18 House Budget Amendment Priorities letter to the Boston delegation, of two important budget amendments: SNAP Gap and MA Food Trust
- ➤ Testified at Statehouse in support of SNAP Gap/Common App legislation
- > Signed on to numerous state, national letters encouraging protection of safety net programs, including SNAP

#### Summer Food Service Program

- Piloting site at Mattapan BPL in collaboration with Project Bread and Mattapan Food and Fitness Coalition
- Piloting site in City Hall Plaza in collaboration with MONUM
- BPS FNS sponsoring both sites
- Conversations with BPHC about expanding into CHCs and BHA sites
- Plans to roll out even more programs and outreach next summer
- Convening the Boston Food Access Council
- ♦ Gathering Quantitative and Qualitative data for the Food Insecurity Assessment Report

## Data Gathering, Listening Sessions cont'd

Topic	# of sessions in which it was mentioned	# of comments made across sessions
Cost	11	72
Mobility/transportation	11	40
Other	10	27
Food quality	10	25
Variety / preferred selection	7	18
Health value	5	15

## Findings

- Community supports (Meals on Wheels, community meals, school meals) not meeting dietary or cultural preferences
- •<5 were aware of Bounty Bucks</p>



## Data Gathering, Food Access Surveys

## Surveys Results


- 241 Total Surveys
- 43% of participants reported being born outside of US
- Half of participants were 60+ years old
- Participants valued convenient location and affordable fresh food most
- On average each family spent \$100 per person each month on food
- Participants got food from grocery stores (77.2%), food banks/pantries (33.2%) and farmers' markets (29.5%)



#### **Food Needs/Asset Map**

- Partnered with BPHC, GBFB, BPDA, DPH, Elderly Commission, and more, to gather data sets
- Data is categorized into three sections:
  - Demographics
  - Food Resources
  - Food Insecurity and Food Access Data
- Overlay subsets of each category to identify food insecurity/food access trends, in addition to other statistical analysis






#### **Viewing the Data Map:**

Map shows the percentage of residents in an East Boston neighborhood who did not graduate high school or receive a GED.






#### Viewing the data map:

Map shows farmer's market locations throughout the city.





#### **Viewing the Data Map:**

Maps shows the percentage of surveyed residents in Mattapan who revealed that the food they bought did not last, or that they did not have money to buy more food.
