



What you see on Cummins now is a temporary redesign to slow speeding drivers and improve safety for all users while we work on the design of the Cummins Highway Reconstruction.

We plan to reconstruct Cummins Highway

Cummins Highway hasn't been updated since the **spring of 1955**.

The street cars that ran along Cummins were removed in 1953 to make room for more cars.

The street's layout reflects the priorities of the 1950's: enable non-residents to drive quickly through our neighborhoods.



During a reconstruction project we completely rebuild the street, including sidewalks, curbs, street lights, traffic signals, road pavement, and replace or update utilities as necessary.

The City has budgeted approximately **\$12 million** for reconstruction of Cummins Highway.









We cannot produce a design without your input. You will help shape how Cummins should be for the next 70 years.

Currently, we are doing community outreach to inform the final design. We have not begun the engineering work to design the corridor.

Boston Planning & Development Agency

The Boston Planning & Development Agency (BPDA) is the planning and economic development agency for the City of Boston.

The BPDA works with people and communities across all neighborhoods of Boston, to plan and build the future of the City. The planning department specifically works with the community to create long-term visions for places.

BPDA collaborates with many departments, including the Public Works Department and the Transportation Department. We work together to review developments that impact the road network, and plans to make sure that each street project is addressing community values and goals.



What is PLAN: Mattapan?

PLAN: Mattapan is a neighborhood-wide planning initiative that works closely with the community to review past planning efforts, and identify needs and opportunities for improvements which will support the long-term equitable growth and sustainability of the neighborhood.

PLAN: Mattapan will...

Strengthen the existing culture and stability of the community by supporting affordable housing, creating opportunities for businesses to thrive, and enhancing connections to improve the neighborhood's experience accessing jobs and spaces where people gather.




What do we study?

In Mattapan, we study housing, economic development, climate change, the environment, and mobility.

We do this through understanding existing conditions as well as community values and goals.

We then PLAN for the future of both the neighborhood and the City, linking values and goals to new policies, guidelines, and ultimately the implementation of PLAN: Mattapan.





Improve quality of life by promoting healthy environments and preparing for Climate Change.




Drive inclusive economic growth through support for local economies and increase access to opportunities within and external to Mattapan.



Land Uses and Mobility - Community

Through PLAN: Mattapan, we worked with the community to identify additional "nodes," which are mixed-use areas where commercial, retail, and residential uses are located.

Nodes provide opportunities for people to gather and create a destination for the neighborhood.

They also create opportunities for residents to have multiple destinations, relying more on walking and biking.



Land Use and Mobility - Safety and Access


PLAN: Mattapan also looks at safety and access.

- Access to parks and community amenities, to name a few
- Safety of pedestrians, cyclists, and transit users

We heard a lot about how getting around Mattapan is hard for all users but mostly unsafe for pedestrians and cyclists due to the speed of cars.



Land Use and Mobility - Healthy Environments



The health of the community and the environment are linked.

Streets, buildings, and the public realm directly impact health.

Healthy streets include trees, safe access for all users, places for people to gather, and reduced traffic congestion.

How does this impact the redesign of Cummins Highway?

The Cummins Highway Redesign is one opportunity to implement the values of PLAN: Mattapan, as communicated by residents and the goals of previous planning efforts.

Cummins Highway Planning Guidelines

Fairmount Indigo Planning Initiative


- The study identified corridor wide opportunities for commercial and residential development, transit access, public realm enhancements, and community building initiatives.
- The community priorities and goals for public realm improvement on Cummins Highway include:
 - Improving the pedestrian connection between Mattapan Square and the Station entry
 - Improving pedestrian safety sidewalk width, reducing and consolidating curb cuts and improving crossing
 - Visually reduce roadway width
 - Improve bicycle connections and safety



Cummins Highway Planning Guidelines

Go Boston 2030

- City of Boston's comprehensive transportation plan that includes our goals and targets as well as a list of projects and policies that will be implemented.
- Cummins Hwy. specific recommendation:
 - As a neighborhood connector it needs enhancements to improve travel safety, accommodate people biking, and make walking more comfortable.
 - A protected, multi-use trail extending the Southwest Corridor to the Neponset Greenway



The Cummins Highway reconstruction goal: safer, more accessible

Transform Cummins Highway into a **tree-lined neighborhood street** that is safer for families to walk, wait for the bus, ride bikes, or travel by vehicle.

It will connect residents to the City's network of open spaces and make it easier for elders to cross the street.


Input to inform the Cummins Highway reconstruction

Data collection and analysis:

 Our engineers collect traffic volumes and model traffic flow. They conduct observations and evaluate available crash data.

Input to inform the Cummins Highway reconstruction

Data collection and analysis

Community input:

 Community input we receive is used to inform our understanding of the corridor and create the final design for the reconstruction.

When you provide input with an issue or idea we go out on the corridor to observe, collect data, and research what we can do in the design to address your need while also balancing the needs of others and the goal of the project.

Focused conversations and input

We will continue to have conversations with you about the redesign of Cummins Highway. Your input during these discussions will be used to inform the design of Cummins and will be shared with other departments to inform their work as well.

In June we hosted a special edition of T-Talk with Charles T. Brown to discuss ways mobility of Black Americans is limited in the U.S. through police, policies, and polity.

In July we hosted two virtual meetings with the Environment Department.

Focused conversations and input

In July we hosted two virtual meetings with the Environment Department:

We talked about the City's heat resilience study and the redesign on Cummins. During this conversation we heard:

- You would like us to add more shade. We are looking into trees and shelters. Look for a community conversation in the coming months!
- You were concerned about the temporary redesign and its impact on emergency services and traffic.

We talked about air quality and how transportation policies and design influence air quality. During this conversation we heard:

- You were interested in us monitoring air quality on the corridor. We are looking at locations where air quality monitors can be located in the project area.
- You were concerned about the temporary redesign on Cummins Highway and how traffic is affecting air quality.




Happening in Mattapan: Stay cool!





Happening in Mattapan: Beginner-friendly Bike Rides


